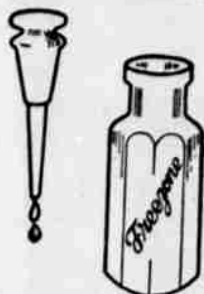

Rural District Being Deserted

TACOMA, Wash., Sept. 16—A movement from rural districts to the cities is shown in population statistics for Washington. Though the state has made a gain of 214,325, since 1910, there was a falling off in the rural communities.

Thirteen farming communities in the state lost population in the ten year period and no purely agricultural county made any material gain. The state increase is due to the growth of cities of 25,000 population and upward the figures disclose.

County Gained Two Residents

(By Associated Press.)

DALLAS, Texas, Sept. 16—Cochran County, Texas, which gained two inhabitants in the last ten years, and now has a population of 67, according to figures announced by the United States census bureau for the year 1920, dates its history back to the early settlement of West Texas, and has less than one inhabitant to every square mile of territory.

The first census of the county was taken in 1900, when enumerators succeeded in finding 25 residents. During the next ten years the county had a phenomenal growth—from 25 to 65 inhabitants—or 160 percent. Then the "boom" petered out and in the next ten years but two people were added to the total.

Cochran county was formed in 1874 from another large county which lies to the east of it. It is situated on the Texas-New Mexico line and was named for Robert Cochran a Boston man who settled in what is now Cochran county and opened a frontier store before the civil war. Edwards is the only settlement in the county and is reached by a small railroad from New Mexico. Big stock ranches occupy most of the county. There is no county organization and not even a post office in the entire county.

Plane Requires Fine Timber.

There is no other industry for which a greater variety of fine timber is required, and none in which the timber must be seasoned more carefully than plane-building. The varieties include Canadian spruce, American oak and white wood, Honduras mahogany and best English beech. Sounding boards are made of Swiss pine, the "Abies Excelsa," which is nothing but the Christmas tree with which we are all so familiar. All this timber has to be seasoned in a special heating chamber, where it is subjected for days together to a powerful draft of dry air. It was not until more than half of the eighteenth century had passed that the plane became popular.
