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Live Stock Entries Grow In Number

Although the livestock entries for the 1920 state fair do not close until the 15th of September, the list to date is much larger than in any previous year. Premiums have been increased substantially, which no doubt had much to do toward making it worth while for some of the largest producers of the Middle West and South as well as the Pacific Coast states to make large exhibits.

The showing of swine is to be particularly notable, being the largest one ever made. Three large herds of Tamworths will be exhibited at the coming fair coming here from Bethany, Ill., and Easton, S. C., their owners being rated among the largest live stock men in the country.

A big herd of Herefords will be sent from the Glendale Stock Farm of Aspen, Colo., and Condon and Battles of Yakima, Wash., who have the largest herd of Poll Angus cattle on the Pacific coast, will be represented. J. H. Mahen, of Canby, Ore., will bring in full herd of Ayrshires; James McNeerney, of Carlton, Oregon, will bring Herefords and L. A. Bowes of Calgary, Canada will bring some shorthorns.

The rabbit and poultry exhibits will be combined, the former being featured for the first time.

The goat exhibit will be larger than ever before, milk goats to be given a place of special importance.

A. C. Ruby of Portland and D. F. Burge of Albany will be the largest exhibitors of draft horses in the state, outsiders however, being well represented.

The judges for the various livestock departments will be as follows: Guernseys, H. W. Griswold, West Salem, Wis.; Horses, Prof. J. M. Fuller professor of animal husbandry at the Wisconsin Agricultural College; Poultry, George Wells, of Oshkosh, Wis.; Beef Cattle, C. W. McCampbell, of Manhattan, Kansas; Swine, Hugh Walters, Townsend, Montana and C. M. Talmadge of Salem; Sheep and Goats, Robert F. Miller, Davis, Calif.; Dairy Cattle, John M. Smith, Spokane, Wash.; Rabbits, J. D. Inlow of Portland.
