Estimates on Fruit Loss Are Varied

Fruit reports from various sections of the county sound about as cheerful as the secretary's report of the national convention of pomologists. The rain today has added a burden to the one already borne by the prune growers, who are already frantic because of their inability to gather the prunes shaken from the trees by the recent wind storm. Their driers are overcrowded and the growers are unable to secure sufficient labor to gather in the prunes that are down. Then comes the rain which will hasten brown rot and makes the situation worse. However it is believed that the storm is practically over and that there will be little loss in prunes.

F. B. Guthrie, field manager for the Oregon Growers Association says that the commercial apple loss due to the wind will not reach more than five percent. Although large quantities of fruit were shaken off the trees, he states that after a careful examination that many of the apples were wormy or otherwise diseased and were unfit for commercial use and that consequently the loss will not reach above 5 percent.

The County Fruit Inspector, is inclined to put the figure much higher and his estimate corresponds to early reports that the drop has reached approximately 25 per cent. He agrees, however, that a large portion of the drop was not commercial and could not have been sold.

The Spitznberg's suffered the worst according to reports, with the Newtons second. The drop in Johnathans and Winter Bananas was smaller than in the other two varieties it is stated.

Finally, when emaciated from hunger—he could not be induced to eat, the Airedale plunged down the shaft 200 feet, and was crushed to death at the bottom.
