Teacher Shortage Menacing Schools

The teacher shortage remains a menace to the public schools according to preliminary reports made public today by the National Education association. Replies to the questionnaires sent out by the association have come from all sections of the United States. These reports show that in places where the teacher's salaries have been increased one hundred percent or more, the situation is nearly always satisfactory. But such places are comparatively few, and in localities where salaries have been increased fifty percent or less, the shortage is commonly greater than a year ago. Rural communities are the hardest hit. Signed reports from superintendents of many counties indicate that a third of their schools cannot open for want of teachers. Tens of thousands of schools will be in charge of teachers who have had no professional preparation and whose academic training barely exceeds that of the children they teach.

Relief from the serious situation, which imperils the stability of the American rural life, will be sought from the next session of congress. Renewed efforts will be made to obtain the passage of the Smith-Tower Bill, which creates a department of education with the secretary in the president's cabinet and provides for federal aid of \$100,000,000 for education.

Three Men Seen Running From Scene

NEW YORK, Sept. 20—Statements by two men, one of whom claims to have seen the "death wagon" which caused the explosion standing near the assay office at 13.30 a. m. Thursday, one and a half hours before the explosion in Wall street occurred, and the other claims to have seen three men running away from the scene just before the blast furnished the most important developments today in the investigation of the disaster.

Information that three suspicious looking men were seen running away from the scene was furnished by Samuel B. Wellington, president of the West Indies Trading Company, who declared he left a lawyer's office on Wall street a few minutes before noon Thursday and as he did, he heard voices calling:

"Hurry,"

"Beat it,"

"Get out of this."

He looked across the street and saw two middle aged men who looked to him like "east side peddlers" beckoning and calling to a third man on the other side of the street nearer the assay office and across the street from the Morgan bank. The third man, believed to be about 60 years old and described as being "groasy looking," was then peering into the ramshackle wagon at the curb. In response to the call of the others, the third man, Mr. Wellington said, started to run after them toward William street. He took them for bond thieves, he added, and expected to see them chased by a policeman. When he reached the corner of Nassau street he was knocked unconscious by the explosion.

Harding Leads In Rexall Straw Vote

The first figures in the Rexall straw vote today gave Harding almost a three to one lead in the state and in Roseburg. The vote started yesterday and the national returns from the 8000 stores located in cities and towns all over the country will be received tomorrow. The women's vote and the men's vote is being taken separately in order to obtain a check. Out of 58 persons voting yesterday, at the local Rexall store, 44 cast votes for Harding and 14 for Cox. The women voted 14 for Harding and 4 for Cox, the men 30 for Harding and 10 for Cox. In the state Harding polled 495 votes and Cox 165. The men voted 130 for Harding and 127 for Cox, while the women cast 115 votes for Harding and 38 for Cox.

MANY CLAIMS ADJUSTED

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Sept. 21—In the year just passed the American Legion has settled claims aggregating \$10,000,000 in favor of former soldiers or sailors or their dependents, according to the annual report of National Adjutant Lemuel Bolles which will be submitted at the national convention of the American Legion, which convenes in Cleveland on September 27.

Of this amount, claims totalling more than \$1,250,000 were adjusted by the service division of national headquarters where only complicated cases are handled. The remainder were settled by the service departments of the states and by the local posts. Of the 9,700 posts in the Legion more than 8,000 now have service officers.

This is one feature of Legion activity and has been one of the best drawing cards for new membership. Since November 1919, Mr. Bolles report shows the Legion has grown from 4,000 posts in fifty departments to 9,700 posts in seventy departments. The enrolled membership has passed the 2,000,000 mark.
