UNABLE TO EXPLAIN GENIUS

Handel was only seven when he insisted on following his father to the court of Saxe-Weissenfels, whose prince, hearing him play on the organ to church after the service was over, persuaded his father to give the boy a chance. By the time he was nine he began to compose church services for voices and instruments and did so every week for three years.

A story is told of Handel that while seated at dinner with some other musicians he exclaimed, "Oh, I have de taught!" Handel did this several times, when one of the friends looked through the keyhole and saw him pouring down some burgundy which an admirer had sent him and he did not wish to share with the others.

When a singer complained to Handel that the style of his accompaniments distracted the attention of the hearers from the singer to the musician and that if he did not accompany him better he would jump up on the harpsichord (the piano of that time) and smash it. Handel replied: "Fine! Tell me when you are going to do that and I shall advise it, for more people will come to see you jump than to hear you sing."

MAN'S FIRST DWELLING PLACE

Scientists Claim That the Desert of Gobi Must for Natural Reasons Be the Spot.

The desert of Gobi, which is the summit of the central steppe in Asia is the most elevated region on the globe, and it is here, scientists claim, man first lived, arguing that this point of earth must have been the first to emerge from the universal sea, and that as the subsiding waters gradually gave up lower regions of earth to man he was able to descend and spread himself progressively over new acquisitions.

It is from this region that the great rivers of Asia take their rise and flow toward the four cardinal points. On the declivities of these highlands are the plains of Tibet, lower than the frozen regions of Gobi. Here are found not only the vine, the olive, rice, the legumina, and other plants on which man has depended for sustenance, but also those animals which he has tamed and led with him over the earth, as the ox, the horse, the ass, the sheep, the goat, the camel, the hog, the dog, and even the reindeer, run wild upon these mountains.

On the mountains of Cashmere, in Tibet, and in the north of China, grain has been found to be growing wild for years without ever being sown or tilled, and here also wild animals that have lived there while man has tamed others of the same species, are numerous.—Exchange.

MANY ACCOUNTANTS NEEDED.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 22.—The United States civil service commission states that there are more than 100 vacancies in high-grade accounting positions under the interstate commerce commission paying salaries ranging from \$2100 to \$3900 a year. The positions are principally in the field. When employees are absent from headquarters an allowance for subsistence is made. Until further notice the civil service commission will receive application for positions of examiner of accounts to fill these vacant positions. Applicants will be rated on their education, training and experience.

Full information and application blanks may be obtained from the United States Civil Service Commission, Washington, D. C., or from its representative at the post office or customhouse in any city.

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO IMPROVE FOWLER STREET.

Notice is hereby given that at a meeting of the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, held on the 20th day of September, 1920, the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, that the Common Council of the City of Roseburg deems it expedient and necessary and hereby proposes to improve Fowler street from the north line of Court street to the north line of Lot 11, Block 7, Chadwick Addition to said city, in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, in the following manner:

- First: By grading the street to the proper subgrade;
- Second: By paving the roadway of said street twenty-four feet wide with concrete pavement;
- Third: By constructing concrete curbs;
- Fourth: By constructing sub-drains, if necessary;
- Fifth: By constructing street monuments, if necessary;
- Sixth: By laying vitrified sewer pipe;
- Seventh: By constructing catch-basins and inlets.

Said improvements are to be made in accordance with the charter and ordinances of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and the grade, plans, specifications and estimates of the City Engineer, filed in the office of the City Recorder on the 20th day of September, 1920, which said grade, plans, specifications and estimates are hereby approved and adopted.

The entire cost of said improvement, including the cost of engineering, advertising, abstracting, clerical help and interest, shall be assessed upon the property especially benefited thereby, as provided by the Charter of the City of Roseburg, and in accordance with the petition of the property owners to be benefited by said improvement, and no part thereof shall be paid by the City of Roseburg.

The estimate of the City Engineer of the probable cost of said improvement is the sum of \$4136.55. Resolved, that the City Recorder of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, be and he is hereby directed to give notice of said proposed improvement as provided by the Charter of the City of Roseburg.

Remonstrances against said proposed improvement may be filed with the undersigned within twenty days from the first publication of this notice, which is the 22nd day of September, 1920.

Magnet Has Many Uses.

A highly important use of a magnet is that in which it is sometimes employed to withdraw small pieces of iron from such out of the way places as the human eye. Another use of the attractive force of magnetism on a much larger scale was that to which it was put by Edison in his magnetic ore separator, in which the ore, previously crushed to a fine powder, is dropped down a chute past the poles of powerful electro-magnets, in passing which the iron particles of the ore are deflected to one side, while the non-magnetic stone dust continues undeflected down the chute. Still another instance of the employment of magnetism in a small way is that in which a magnetized tack hammer is used in the manufacture of strawberry baskets on a large scale in conjunction with a mechanical device which presents the tacks, one at a time and head up, to the operative, thereby greatly facilitating his work.

A Psychologist's Morning After.

I had two days spoiled by a psychological experiment with mesal, an intoxicant used by some of our southwestern Indians in their religious ceremonies—a sort of cactus bud of which the United States government had distributed a supply to certain medical men, including Weir Mitchell, who sent me some to try. He had himself been "in fairyland." It gives the most glorious visions of color—every object thought of appears in a jeweled splendor unknown to the natural world. It disturbs the stomach somewhat, but that, according to W. M., was a cheap price. I took one but three days ago, was violently sick for twenty-four hours, and had no other symptom whatever except that and the katzenjammer the following day.—From Letter of William James, Atlantic Monthly.

Aluminum Brass.

Experiments aimed at developing the resistance of brass to the action of sea water, with a view to its employment for constructing submarines in France, have, it is reported, shown some remarkable results from the addition of aluminum. The internal structure of the alloy is strikingly changed by a very small percentage of aluminum and the color changes are surprising.

From half of 1 per cent up to 5 per cent of aluminum gives the brass a deep golden color. If the quantity of aluminum is increased beyond 5 per cent a superb rose color results, which reaches its maximum when the aluminum amounts to 7 per cent. With 10 per cent of aluminum the color turns to a silvery white.

Shasta Limited Not Be Restored

Although the Southern Pacific has announced the restoration on October 1 of the Sunset Limited, one of the fast pre-war trains, which will cut the running time between San Francisco and New Orleans eleven hours east bound and two less hours west bound, railroad officials here entertain little hope that the Shasta Limited will again be put into service between Portland and San Francisco. "The Shasta Limited will not be restored, at least for some time," said John M. Scott, traffic manager of the Southern Pacific. "It was the poorest paying train in the service. There are now four trains running daily between Portland and San Francisco, giving a good service, considering the shortage of cars and other apparatus."
