wine welfare of the nation. Every home in the land has paid tribute to the sugar profiteer, because the administration at Washington refuses to do its plain duty.

The remarks of Congressman Hawley, made at the luncheon at the Umpqua Hotel recently, showed up the practical inefficiency of this "world idealism" when applied to every day problems of statesmanship. Congress passed the budget bill, which is of the greatest importance to the extravagance and the waste in government expenditures is to be checked. The president vetoed the bill, because it did not give him the power to remove the controller, the officer designated to have charge of making up the budget. Of course, the budget planned, necessarily places restraint upon the administration in power and the departments and bureaus thereof. To give the president the power to remove the budget officer, would, of course enable the president to remove that officer, and as a practical safeguard, the bill left the power of removal in the hands of congress. To give this power to the president would mean that if the officer's mind "did not go along with" that of the head of the administration, he would of course be removed, and a fundamental principle of the budget act would be nullified.

The time has come to put down the high cost of government.

Those who are leading the democratic party have become drunken with power, intoxicated with extravagance, flabbergasted with floundering and "idealism" until the only hope of the sane, wholesome economical administration lies in the return of the republican party to power. We march under the banner of genuine reform and progress. Let every republican and every democrat who loves his country above party, fall in.

This is no time for splitting the ticket. We not only need Warren G. Harding in the presidential chair, but we need a republican senate. Many republicans admire Senator Chamberlain, but it should be remembered that a vote for Senator Chamberlain is a vote to hamper President Harding in renovating the government. Mr. Stanfield, the republican nominee for the senate is as good a man as Mr. Chamberlain, and he is a man of ability and will stand for those policies which are so important to our country. Even good democrats will see the wisdom of voting for Mr. Stanfield for senator, because since the republicans will undoubtedly win the presidency, it is proper that they should be in control in congress, also, so that there may be no deadlock, and in or-
