Showers Should Be Over Sunday

According to weather indications the present rain storms will be over about Sunday. Local showers may be expected until that time. Weather of the local weather bureau states: An area of high pressure lies between Eureka, California and Los Angeles, and a low pressure is reported in the Cape Flattery district. As long as this condition exists, rain can be expected. The weatherman states: Fluctuations in barometer readings show the areas to be shifting and changing and it is very probable he says that there will be good weather the first of the week. Prune men are very anxious, for although there has been but little damage up to the present time, the condition is not in the least encouraging. However, Douglas county is far ahead of the other sections for reports of serious losses are heard from all sections. Clarke County is reporting brown rot, while from Salem comes a message that thousands of dollars worth of prunes have been lost by splitting.
