Legion to Reduce Hi Cost O' Livin'

CLEVELAND, Sept. 25—A flood of letters into national headquarters of the American Legion, temporarily established here preliminary to the opening of the national convention, September 27, indicates that great interest has been aroused among the veterans by the announcement last week of a project to reduce living costs to Legion members and their families.

The plan proposes an organization, with representatives in practically every community in the country, of a league of retail dealers to be known as the American Legion Stores association, the members of which would accord stated discounts from current prices to Legion members and their families. The plan has been submitted to heads of large retail establishments in many cities and has been pronounced sound. It will be submitted to the delegates of the Legion convention for approval.

The organization as planned would reach into every community where Legion posts are established. One dealer in every line would be admitted to membership, the dealers to be selected by the local body of the Legion. In large towns more than one dealer would be selected in every class. It is believed that the saving in discounts of Legionnaires would come to at least five per cent. The co-operative idea is not a new one but never has been attempted on so large a scale.
