Says Forest Fire Loss Is Needless

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27.—Every time there is a forest fire it is a contributing factor to the increasing price of lumber, according to Charles Lathrop Pack, president of the American Forestry association, who, in a statement here today denounced the needless \$50,000,000 annual forest fire loss of the United States as "a wasteful strain upon the resources of the nation." Standing timber is being cut and destroyed by fire, diseases and insects, he said, more than four times as fast as new trees are being grown.

"Here is an example of what confronts the nation," said Mr. Pack. "The wholesale prices on upper grades of soft wood lumber in New York were from \$29 to \$25 a thousand feet prior to 1865, when mills in the same state supplied the market; from \$35 to \$45 between 1865 and 1917 when most of the supply came from the lake states and the south, and are now entering a general level of \$120 a thousand feet."

with a large part of the lumber coming from the Pacific coast. "Many industries have been forced to secure their supplies of timber at any price. The output of certain tire industries has been reduced much as 50 per cent. Shoes have fared worse than luxuries. ramifications of lumber shortages high prices are limitless and have affected seriously practically every population."

Mr. Pack, as the head of the organization keenly interested in serving the nation's forests, prefaces his statement with the hope that prevention would be "preached every school in the land on Friday, October 8, the day before Prevention Day was proclaimed by President Wilson, when their pupils expected to inform their pupils of unnecessary fire hazards and to reduce the country's total annual loss of \$250,000,000."
