GETTING HIGHWAY READY FOR WINTER

Possible For Winter.

RACING WITH ELEMENTS

Narrow Strip of Gravel Will be Put on Over Entire Section Between Roseburg and Wilbur and Roadbed Widened.

Providing the weather remains good for two weeks the Pacific highway both north and south of Roseburg will be put in good condition for winter travel, according to J. C. Mc-Leod, assistant state highway engineer in charge of this diarrie. The contractors have been instructed by the highway commission to do everything in their power to put the roads in proper shape for bad weather and every effort is being put forth to this end.

Between Roseburg and Wilbur practically the entire highway will be graveled. Already the Bad stretch near Winchester is being so treated and will be in condition to bear

near Winchester is being so treated and will be in condition to bear travel all winter. The section between Oakland and Sutherlin is almost completed and vill be opened for travel this week. The long detour which has been necessary will then be eliminated.

The Winston-Myrile Creek paying

The Winston-Myrile Creek paying is practically completed and will be thrown open in about two weeks, Mr. McLeod reports. At the present time the contractors are working on the Myrile Creek end of the pavement and the teams are crossing and recrossing the road so that traffic cannot be allowed over the highway until the work is finished.
