NATIONAL HEALTH CRUSADE STARTED

Free Public Clinics Being Established in Many Cities for the Osteopathic Treatment of the Poor.

A country-wide crusade for better health has just been started by the American Osteopathic Association. Free public clinics are being established in cities in all the states for the osteopathic treatment of the poor. Lectures on the prevention of disease are being given in various community centers. "Better Babies" conferences are being held by the women osteopathic physicians for the benefit of mothers and infants.

Osteopathic hospitals have been built in several cities recently and a number of others are projected for the immediate future.

The osteopathic colleges report a large increase in the number of matriculants, enlargement of facilities, and a still higher standard of entrance and curriculum requirements.

Great industrial plants, mills, factories, and large commercial houses are installing osteopathic departments for the purpose of keeping their workers fit, decreasing absences due to sickness and increasing the output by raising the physical efficiency. Several railroad companies have also added osteopathic specialists to their staff of physicians who restore injured employees to active service.

Accident insurance companies have discovered that injured men whom they care for under the Workmen's Compensation Act and employers' liability contracts are in many cases returned to wage earning very much sooner under osteopathic treatment than heretofore. This has resulted in a number of the greatest insurance companies installing osteopathic specialists in their offices in various cities to care for these cases.

Laws regulating the practice of osteopathy have now been passed in every state in the Union. This means that osteopathy is now standardized and regulated by law in a manner analogous to that by which the practice of medicine is controlled. Unqualified, incompetent and illegal practitioners of osteopathy are therefore now barred from practice by law and the public is just as well protected from injury by unqualified osteopaths as it is saved from harm by unregistered medical doctors. No osteopath can practice in any state in the Union now without being legally registered by the state.

Educational standards in osteopathic colleges have been raised to the level of medical standards and are enforced most rigidly. There are only seven osteopathic colleges in the world, and they are all members of the Associated Colleges of Osteopathy. This organization compels absolute uniformity of entrance requirements and a minimum curriculum of study hours and subjects equal to that of medical schools. The length of the course of study in osteopathic colleges is four years and no person can enter without a high school education. These colleges are located in Chicago, Philadelphia, Boston, Kansas City, Des Moines, Kirksville, Mo., and Los Angeles.

Large general surgical and obstetrical hospitals are maintained in conjunction with osteopathic colleges, the largest being in Kirksville, Chicago, Des Moines, and Philadelphia. It is only a matter of time when hospitals will be added to the equipment of the other colleges.

Osteopathic colleges are chartered educational institutions, authorized by the states to confer degrees. They are not conducted for the purpose of profit, but entirely from the educational standpoint.

Osteopathy, then, is a school of practice, the basic principle of which is the mechanical adjustment of the body. This is so simple that it is difficult to see why there should be any misunderstanding regarding it. Osteopaths are mechanical physicians, or mechanicians of the human body. As the spine is the central support of the structure of the body and as it contains the spinal cord which is the main cable of nerves extending from the brain through the whole length of the trunk, the adjustment of the spine is necessarily the most important part of the work of the osteopath. Surgery being mechanical, is of course embraced within the scope of osteopathy although body adjustment by the hands of the osteopath saves the patient from a very large percentage of avoidable operations.

Nothing which is scientifically true regarding the human body as taught by the older schools of practice is denied in the teachings of osteopathy. Osteopathy is not a system of negation, or a denial of the tenets of other schools of practice. It is not destructive. It is constructive. There are plenty of sects and cults based primarily upon denial or denunciation of others. Osteopathy is not of these. There is no instrument of precision used in diagnosis in the old schools, which is not utilized by the osteopaths. Osteopathy is necessarily based upon anatomy, physiology, chemistry and the other fundamental sciences underlying all teaching of the art of healing. These sciences all existed within the medical fold before osteopathy was born.

While it is true that nothing which has been proven to be scientifically correct is denied in the tenets of osteopathy it is also true that the mechanical adjustment of the body is such a natural procedure and brings about such remarkable results, that the osteopath has no need for the administration of drugs internally for the treatment of disease.

Potter's Materia Medica says that there is no statement more scientifically proven than the one that the human body contains within itself every substance necessary for the treatment of disease. With such an admission by an authority on drugs, the osteopath has no need to look elsewhere for his remedies. The next proposition is how to make these substances available. Science teaches that the body is the most perfect machine known. Hence osteopathy concludes that a perfect machine with all the substances necessary present, needs only perfect adjustment in order to maintain perfect functioning, which is health.
