WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—The peak of high prices was reached about the middle of July, and since that time the cost of most staple commodities has declined steadily, according to officials of the department of labor. Important among the reductions are those in the wholesale and retail prices of flour, sugar, meat and clothing. It is confidently predicted that during the coming six months prices will fall to lower levels than have been known since early in the war.

SALEM PRUNE DRIER BURNS.

SALEM, Sept. 29.—Fire of undetermined origin Tuesday morning destroyed the prune evaporating plant of E. A. Kurtz, located about four miles north of Salem. The fire was discovered at 7 a. m. and had made such progress that all efforts to save the building were futile.

Mr. Kurtz states that the building and its contents were valued at \$17,000, of which amount only \$5,000 is covered by insurance. The drier had been running at full capacity, and several tons of fresh and dried fruit were in the building.

Tuesday afternoon Mr. Kurtz reported no progress in efforts to discover the cause of the fire.

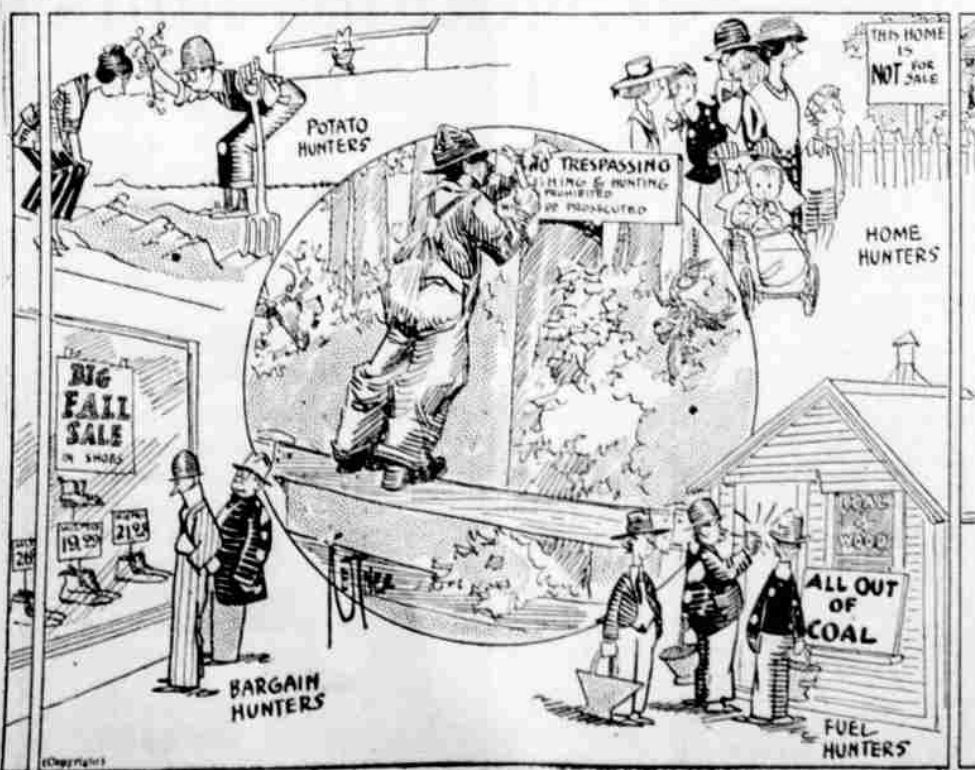
