GEORGE BROWN SUPREME JUSTICE

Will Take Place of A. S. Bennett Who Tendered His Resignation.

HANDLEY GETS POST

Commissioner Will Take Place of Brown as Attorney-General—Local People Delighted Over Appointment.

ROSEBURG, Oct. 1.—George M. Handley, attorney at law, was appointed to the office of attorney-general of Oregon, to succeed A. S. Bennett, who has tendered his resignation. The appointment was made by Governor Olcott, who has received the resignation of Mr. Bennett. Mr. Handley is a well-known attorney in this city and has been in the service of the state for many years. He is a native of Oregon and has a long record of public service. His appointment is a great honor to him and to the state. The people of this city are delighted over the appointment, as they believe Mr. Handley is the best qualified person to fill the position. He is a man of high character and ability, and his appointment is a reflection on the state of Oregon.

Resignation Is Tendered.

Therefore tender his resignation to the governor of the state of Oregon, to take effect on Wednesday, October 6.

Attorney-General Brown was elected to his present office in November, 1919, and entered upon his duties January 1 of the following year. He was re-elected in 1920 and had more than two years yet to serve.

Handley Ex-Deputy Attorney.

Mr. Handley resided in Tillamook before coming to Salem last May. He was deputy district attorney there for many years and served in the upbuilding of the legislature for several sessions. In the latter capacity he was chairman of a number of important committees and was one of the legislators chosen to frame the constitution of the state. He was also a member of the Oregon bar and was one of the most prominent lawyers in the state. His appointment to the office of attorney-general is a great honor to him and to the state. He is a man of high character and ability, and his appointment is a reflection on the state of Oregon.

Bank Book Stolen From Service Station

H. G. Harper, a transient, was arrested last night charged with the robbery of a bank book from the safe of the Willard battery service station on Oak street. The book was stolen yesterday about 11:30. It had been prepared for the bank and contained \$74 in money and a number of checks. Harper was arrested when he persuaded another transient to return the book, minus the cash, and agreed to share the reward. The prisoner claims that he found the book at the exhibit building and that he went at once to the hobo camp at the end of the North Roseburg trestle before he examined it. He said that it was minus the money when he picked it up. When asked why he did not examine it when first finding it he said that if there had been any money in it he would have kept the money. He then confessed to having persuaded another man to take the bank book back to Mr. Nygren in the hope that a reward would be paid for the return of the checks, which he was afraid to cash. His story is being investigated.

Fire Breaks Out Again In Galveston

GALVESTON, Oct. 2.—Fire broke out in the south end of pier 41 this morning. A general alarm was sounded almost immediately and about 250 national guardsmen were rushed to the scene of the conflagration. The fire was first noticed as an explosion blew out windows and doors. It is reported that it was started by spontaneous combustion.

BANQUET TENDERED TO AUTO CARAVAN

Visitors Are Welcomed Last Night—Left This Morning For Trip South.

SEVERAL FINE SPEECHES

Mayor Hamilton and District Attorney Neuner Make Addresses of Welcome—Speakers Explain Purpose of Visit to Coast.

The automobile caravan varying the party of the Park-to-Park Highway enthusiasts arrived in Roseburg last evening shortly before 9 o'clock, about two hours behind their schedule. Though they had had a rather strenuous day, none of the party were in the least discouraged but on the contrary were looking forward to the continuance of their journey with much pleasure. Immediately after reaching the city they were taken in charge by members of the Chamber of Commerce, and in company with a large number of local business men were banqueted at the Umpqua Hotel. Here the visitors explained the purpose of their mission and told of the great benefits that would come from a park to park highway and asked the loyal co-operation of the people of Roseburg to make the road a reality.

The visitors were welcomed to the city by Mayor W. S. Hamilton and Attorney George Neuner, president of the Chamber of Commerce.

Among those with the party were Mrs. Stella Leaviston of San Francisco, M. W. Lusk of the Ohio Automobile Association, Brodney Dave, of the White Truck company who donated the truck for carrying of the luggage, F. C. Owen representing the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, Mr. and Mrs. L. A. Shawnee, of Shoshone, Wyo., Mr. and Mrs. Sands of Oklahoma and Major and Mrs. Pershing of New York, who are traveling with the party looking for a location for a home in the west.

The caravan is composed of 10 cars containing 25 people. The party, speaking in large meetings in every place is maintaining its schedule. Governors of every state are giving official recognition to the movement which is to be put on a permanent footing in the Denver convention, when a stupendous program calling for the expenditure of \$10,000,000 for hard surfacing the road, will be launched.

The caravan started down the coast from Seattle escorted by James Allen, state highway commissioner and Douglas A. Sholor, manager of the automobile club of western Washington, as well as F. L. Wolf, personal representative of Governor Louis F. Hart, of Washington. The official party's visit is resulting in a greater enthusiasm for good roads generally throughout the west in the cities which already enjoy the benefits of 300 miles of hard surfaced roads along the Pacific coast and included as part of the route of the park connecting highway. Club Workers In County Walk Off With Many Awards At State Fair.

FOUR FIRSTS ARE WON

Excellent Record Set by Boys and Girls of County Who Show Well in Individual Exhibits—Win Fifth Prize in Artistic Display.

FAIR GROUNDS, Oct. 1 (Special).—Douglas County's exhibit of club work at the state fair is considered the best ever brought to Salem from the county. Far more projects are represented than usual, and we have more club members working than ever before. This year we have as a feature, the home making project, which is practically new in this state, and in this particular line we have a larger and better exhibit than any county represented here.

Douglas county won fifth prize in artistic arrangement of the booth. There were ten counties competing for this prize. What we lacked in artistic arrangement we made up in exhibits of members in club work and records of members. All expenses are paid and a program is provided so that the prize winner is shown a fine time in addition to obtaining the benefits of the summer course without cost.

The second prize is \$5 in cash, and the remainder of the prizes go on down to \$2 for 5th prize.

There was a great deal of competition in every project, there being over 100 exhibits in several of the different projects shown. Consequently any prize winning work had to be of exceptional merit and it is a great credit to the boys and girls of Douglas county that so many of the prizes were captured.

STRAW VOTE TAKEN BY NEWS-REVIEW

Harding Leads In Early Morning Canvass of Business District.

INTEREST IS GROWING

General Apathy Is Being Discarded and Keener Interest Is Being Taken in Election Which Is Only a Month Away.

With election day only a month away, interest in the political situation appears to be on the increase. For the past few months a general apathy has been apparent, but now with the fruit season practically over a persons hears more discussion regarding various candidates, their qualifications, their chances for election and the aspect of the situation seems to be changing rapidly. Chief interest appears to center in the presidential campaign. Adherents of the respective candidates are beginning to wax enthusiastic over their party leaders and a few fights can be expected within a short time and then the times will have reached the ordinary election level.

At the present time straw balloting is the most popular indoor sport. Everywhere over the United States, business concerns, individuals and cliques are taking preferential votes to determine as near as possible the general standing of the respective candidates for president. At Portland a five day vote carried on by a leading publication has given Harding a two-to-one standing.

The huge straw vote being carried on by the Rexall drug stores show Harding to have a substantial lead. In the last returns he has carried all of the northern and western states with the exception of New Mexico, while Cox had carried all of the southern states with the exception of Maryland.

In order to keep the vote going the News-Review this morning made a canvass of Cass and Jackson streets, recording the preferences of the men and women voters who at the time were employed or doing business in the various stores. Members of the reportorial staff "covered" the two streets gathering up the votes of all who cared to express a preference. The result was almost three to one in favor of Harding, being divided as follows:

Harding, 87.
Cox, 24.
Debs, 4.
Women:
Harding, 19.
Cox, 11.
Debs, 1.

Several votes were recorded for Johnson and Hoover.

"I saw Harding and Cox's pictures on the movie screen and I think Cox is the better looking," was one fair young lady's reason for voting for the democratic candidate.

One sympathetic individual said: "I am going to vote for Debs; that's the only way we can get him out of jail."

"No league of nations for mine," said one republican as he scrawled Harding's name in prominent letters across the small paper ballot.

Some of the women confessed that they had not intended to vote. Some "have not kept up to date on political affairs." Several did not know the names of the candidates. One man wrote "James C. Harding" on his ballot.

The three-to-one vote taken by the News-Review this morning gives Harding a slightly larger lead than the Rexall straw vote which has been in progress for some time. That vote shows slightly better than two-to-one.

According to the Wall Street reports contained in the New York Herald, Wall street is offering substantial odds in favor of the republican candidate. Odds were reported as high as four to one.
