

Official Democratic Statement

Pat McArthur, congressman from Portland is going about the state telling the voters that they should not vote for Cox because of certain editorials that appeared in Cox's two papers, during the early days of the European war. These editorials expressed sympathy for Germany and were written at a time when no one thought of America being drawn into the conflict.

In editorials and contributed articles to the Outlook, Theodore Roosevelt took, as did Cox, the same position. In the early days of the war Roosevelt in both public and in private life expressed sympathy for Germany and boasted of his German parentage. However, there can be no question as to the loyalty to America of either Roosevelt or Cox, when it became apparent that we would be brought into the conflict.

However, this is all apart from the question at this time. The pertinent thing at this stage of the game is to inquire of Pat McArthur, just which candidate is receiving the support of the German-American element. The Literary Digest of last week told specifically how the German-American vote is being organized for Harding. Recent testimony of republican workers before the Senate investigating committee, also told how the republicans had bought up the foreign language papers of the country to spread Harding propaganda. Not only the German-American vote is being organized for Harding, but every element of discontent and disloyalty is being lined up for him.

In other words, all of those elements which have in America during the great war attempted to defeat the purpose and war plans of the United States are loudly shouting for Harding. McArthur's charges of pro-Germanism against Cox are as logical as the position of the Oregonian in supporting McArthur and his consistent subservience to the liquor element, and at the same time becoming the most ardent exponent of prohibition in the state of Oregon.

Of the League, Cox says, "I am in favor of going in." Harding has stated eight different positions on the league, no two of them alike. Yet republicans say that Cox is "not definite" on the league. Can you beat that?

Much is made by republican speakers and writers because Wilson did not purchase the Cuban sugar crop, and thus prevent it falling into the hands of speculators.

In this connection our republican friends neglect to explain that the republican congress was too busy at playing partisan politics to pass the legislation necessary to give the president authority to purchase the Cuban crop. After the sugar crop had been bought up by profiteers,

Such unfair misrepresentation is the foundation of much of the republican campaign.

Counties to Get U. S. Forest Money

A check for \$121,625.51, representing one fourth of all the rentals collected from forest reserves in the state has just been received by the secretary of state's office from the federal treasury department for apportionment among the counties that contain forest reserves.

This money is due the state under the act of Congress of 1908, which requires its use for the benefit of the public schools and the public roads of the counties in which the reserve is located. The reserves contributing to this years disbursement and the amounts derived from each reserve are as follows:

Prune Dishes Are Becoming Popular

The many recipes received by Ray Clarke of the Hotel Umpqua concerning new ways to make the much blasphemed prune as an important item on the bill of fare at the hotel, attest to the popularity that the lowly fruit has been enjoying in many homes. Mr. Clarke has added many new prune dishes to the menu and states that they have met with instant success and approval from the patrons. The following recipes were received this morning with the guarantee that they have been tried many times and are known to be good.

Prune Custard.—Wash and soak over night one pound of prunes. Next morning cook until tender in the same water in which they were soaked. Remove prunes from the juice, take out stone and remove the skin. Rub the fruit through a colander or fruit press. Mix with enough of the juice to make the pulp thin. Return the pulp to a kettle and heat until almost at boiling point. Stir in two well beaten eggs for every pint of fruit. Remove from the fire at once, and add lemon flavoring. Pour into a mold and let cool.

Prune Pudding.—Stew until tender one pound of prunes that have been soaked over night. Add sugar to taste. Remove pits and cut prunes into small pieces. Beat the whites of eight eggs and add gradually into the cold prunes, stirring all the time. Bake about twenty minutes. Serve the pudding once while cooking. Stir with whipped cream. The above is sufficient for a large pudding.

Prune Butter.—This makes enough to last all winter and the longer it stands the better it is.—Take three bushels of prunes before they are dried and boil until tender. Remove the pits and skins. This will give about 15 gallons of pulp. Cook the pulp seven or eight (7 or 8) hours stirring constantly. A brass kettle should be used if possible. Add the sugar and spices to taste, and if possible, chopped nuts. Bottle and let stand until wanted.

Norwegian Prune Pudding.—One half pound of prunes; 1 cup of sugar one-third cup cornstarch; 1 tablespoon lemon juice; 1 inch stick of cinnamon; one and one-third cups of boiling water. Wash prunes and let soak one hour. Boil until tender. Remove stones from prunes, add the sugar, cinnamon and boiling water and let simmer for ten minutes. Dilute cornstarch with enough cold water to pour easily. Add to prune mixture and cook five minutes, then remove cinnamon stick and add the lemon juice, pour into a mold to cool, and serve with cream.

Stuffed Prunes.—Soak over night one pound of prunes. Drain and save the water in which they were soaked. Remove the pits, being careful not to spoil the shape of the fruit and place a blanched or roasted almond in place of the pit. Add to the prune water half a cup of sugar and a teaspoonful of vanilla. Bring to a boil and boil for two minutes. When the prunes are soft lift carefully out of the syrup and set aside to cool.
