Five Candidates
For Brown's Office

SALEM, Or., Oct. 4.—That there probably will be as many as five candidates for the office of attorney-general at the election to be held in Oregon on November 5, was the prediction made by Conrad Olson, of Portland, who was here today conferring with state officials with relation to the distribution of Oregon laws for 1920, which he recently codified under an act of the 1919 legislature.

I. H. Van Winkle, appointed by Governor Olcott to succeed Attorney-General Brown, has let it be known that he will make an active campaign for the office. J. O. Bailey, assistant attorney-general under Mr. Brown and a resident of Portland, yesterday resigned his position and already has started an active campaign for the office. Joseph A. Benjamin, also an assistant in the office of the attorney-general, is said to have informed friends that he, too, is considering the opportunity to get into the race.

J. J. Johnson of Multnomah county has long wanted to be attorney-general, according to word reaching Salem, and it was predicted here today that he would make his formal announcement within the next two or three days. Mr. Johnson once made the race for attorney-general as a Grange candidate, but was defeated in the primary election.

Another man who is likely to be a candidate for the office is Frank Grant, of Portland. Mr. Grant also was a candidate for attorney-general at one time, but was defeated for the nomination by the present incumbent of the office.

All of the men thus far mentioned as prospective candidates for the office are republicans, and the contest may be further complicated by the announcement of a democratic aspirant.

It contends, however, that it is perfectly right for the Harding newspapers to continually refer to Cox as the "wet" or "booze" candidate, although no evidence has ever been offered to show that Cox is any "wetter" than Harding. In brief, any ridiculous charge is held true by the Oregonian against Cox, but any attack on Harding's record, no matter how well backed up by proof, is only "abuse."—Eugene Guard.

THEIR EYES ON MEXICO.

The false alarms of the republican managers and their candidates are full of the terrors of what the League of Nations will expect the United States to do if it becomes a member. Not a word is said of the things we must agree, not to do if we join the forty three countries, which to date have disavowed aggression and subscribed to a guaranteed peace.

Most of these republicans profess a fear that the League of Nations will compel us to engage in benevolent military expeditions in all parts of the world for the protection of the small peoples and in support of causes, romantic if not really visionary. They never refer to the obligations which membership would impose upon us to respect sovereignty and territorial rights of weaker nations. If the republican party is determined to occupy and administer Mexico from coast to coast, as was recently recommended by a committee of the senate, headed by Albert S. Fall, unless that republic revises its constitution in accordance with the ideas of some of our business men, the last ditch opposition to the League of Nations is fully explained on exceedingly practical grounds. The League is designed to prevent that very thing.

In a memorable speech at Mobile in 1913, President Wilson made the statement "that the United States will never seek a foot of territory by conquest." "I say this," he continued, "not with a single thought that any one will betray it, but

merely to fix in our consciousness what our real relationship with the rest of Americans." That noble pledge did more to disarm suspicion of us in Latin America than all the words and deeds of our public men that went before it.

The republican party has never endorsed the position then taken by the president. Individuals have denounced it in the same terms that they apply to the League of Nations. The organization itself in the platform adopted at Chicago went as far as it dared in the way of repudiation. It condemned the policy of "wordy, futile, written protests," which have brought "American ideals of justice, national honor and political integrity into contempt" in Mexico, and it promised to "enforce respect for the American flag," in whose folds some of our biggest and greediest interests have draped themselves.

With the United States a member of the League of Nations, Mexico would soon be invited to take its place in the same company. Article X of the Covenant says: "The members of the League undertake to respect and preserve against external aggression the territorial integrity and political independence of all the members of the League." This is the Mobile pledge with the sanction of international agreement. Assuming, as there is reason for doing, that one of the first acts of a republican ad-

ministration will be the aggression beyond the Rio Grande, a powerful objection to the League of Nations not as yet honestly asserted by the senatorial cabal, becomes as plain as a pikestaff.
