Dear Sir—I read your item in the paper concerning prunes. We like baked prunes best.

We also like baked prunes and apples. Use any kind of baking dish and core the apples, and place in the baking pan. Fill in the holes made by the removal of the cores and add a little water. Sprinkle the whole with brown and sugar, and add a little water. Then bake. In cooking dried prunes we often add a slice of lemon orange to them.
