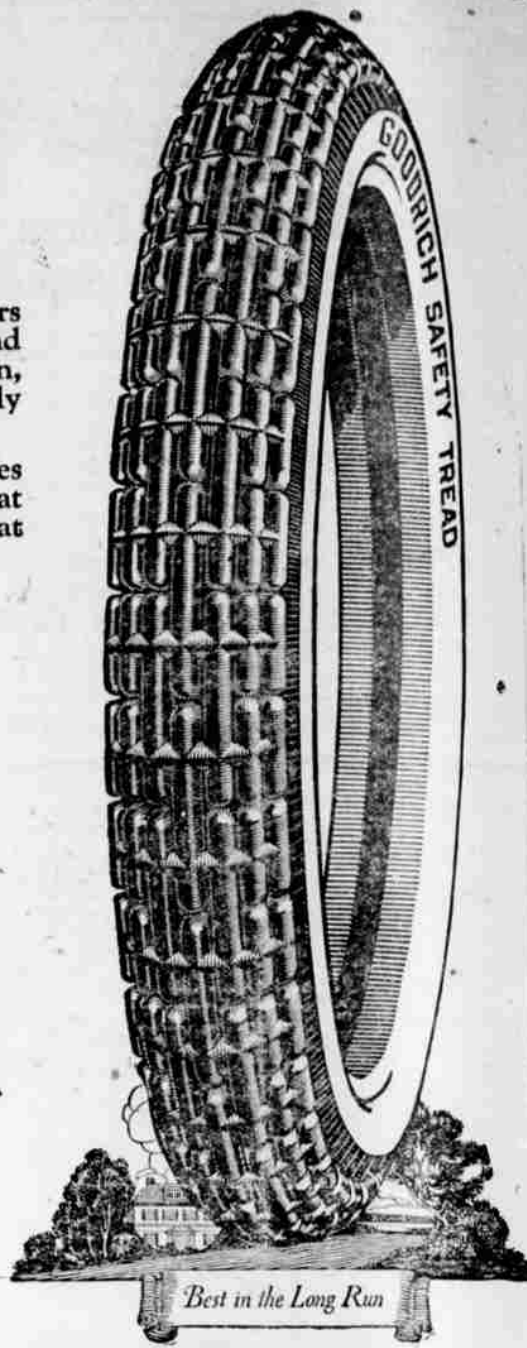

WILL SALVAGE PRUNE CROP.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 3.—Thousands of school children from all parts of Marion county will invade the prune orchards tomorrow morning in the last effort to salvage at least a part of this season's crop. It has been raining here almost continuously for more than two weeks, and the loss already resulting from the precipitation will total many thousands of dollars.

With the assistance of the school children and fair weather, however, some of the prune growers will be able to save 25 per cent of their yield. Children who fail to attend school during the next three days and are actually engaged in picking prunes need not fear trust officers, according to announcement.

FRUIT MEN WANT SUN.

HOOD RIVER, Or., Oct. 3.—A week of sunshine beginning tomorrow, would be welcome to orchardists, most of whom are busy with full or partial crews to begin picking apples. In many instances today growers took advantage of the sunshine between showers to gather Winter Bananas and other early varieties, picking of which has been delayed by rains.

The continuing rains have become a sore subject to fruitgrowers. Pickers are leaving places where accommodations are poor. Fears are entertained of a windstorm following the rains.

GRAZING EXPERT HERE.

D. C. Ingram, grazing examiner for the U. S. forest service, arrived in Roseburg today after spending considerable time in the Slaktyon forest. He left this afternoon for the Crater lake forest where he will investigate the Matney gulch experiment. At Matney gulch the forest service has been making experiments in reseedling and Mr. Ingram is giving very careful attention to the growth of various kinds of shrubs.

ANTHRACNOSE THREATENS

Wide awake growers are getting everything ready to spray their apple orchards for anthracnose control just as soon as the fruit is off the trees. H. P. Bars, plant pathologist of the Oregon station finds it would be well for the sprayers to follow the pickers in all orchards not having the early fall or August application. Bordeaux 6-6-50 is used, and every particle of bark surface on the tree is covered.

WHEAT SEED IS TREATED

Farmers who are having visions of a big crop of clean wheat next harvest are planning to give smut the knockout in all late plantings. The early rains have germinated the smut spores in the soil and unless these spores find young plants to unite with, they will not live more than six weeks from the first good wetting. Hence, if the seed is properly treated on these plantings, the crop may be expected to be about smut free. Growers wanting help in treatment can get directions by sending to the O. A. C.
