MILITARY FUNERAL SUNDAY AFTERNOON

Body of Private Roy Smith Arrives in Roseburg This Morning.

LEGION TAKES CHARGE

All Ex-Service Men Are To Be At The Armory at 11:30 to provide Military Escort for Body of Deceased Comrade.

The body of Private Roy A. Smith who died at St. Nazaire, France, arrived in this city this morning and will be buried with full military honors Sunday afternoon.

The deceased was born Dec. 2, 1895, and spent practically all of his life in Douglas county. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Smith of Glendale, his father serving as superintendent of the state fish hatchery at that place.

The body was interred at St. Nazaire, great tribute being paid at that time by the French people who attended the funeral of American soldiers in great numbers paying the tribute to Uncle Sam's fighting men by their presence.

The services will be held under the auspices of the American Legion, which requests all ex-service men, whether members of the local post or not, to meet at the armory at 11:30 to organize for participation.

Following the services the body will be taken to the Oak Creek cemetery, where burial will take place. A firing squad composed of Lester Wimberly, Charles Springer, Richard Bush, John McClintock, Avery Roser, Roy Campbell, Charles Stanton and Woodson Maddox will fire the last salute.

Pall bearers will be selected from the ranks of uniformed men, and the escort will be composed of uniformed ex-soldiers.

The Legion especially urges that all men who can do so be present promptly at 11:30, in order to give time for brushing up on drill movements. Automobiles will be provided for all persons who care to go to the cemetery.

In doing this work as a feature of its campaign to control venereal diseases, the board has taken the position that education as a means of preventing these diseases should be developed not by placing special and dramatic emphasis on the subject, but by giving it normal consideration and studying it in its proper relation to other divisions of hygiene.

Oregon's State University enters upon this new work this fall.
