**AGE OF USED CARS IS OFTEN CONFUSED**

Dealer Offers to Give Accurate Information, Even to People Who Buy From Competitors.

An unusual service in view of the fact that it is intended primarily for persons who do business with a competitor, has been announced by the J. O.
