## Other Hotels Ask For Prune Recipes

More prune recipes are being received daily by Ray W. Clarke of the Umpqua Hotel. Mr. Clarke stated this morning that many had been placed on the menu and met with almost universal success. Other hotels have written Mr. Clarke, asking that the recipes be forwarded and Mr. Clarke has complied by sending them the clippings from the Roseburg News-Review. The clippings have also been sent to John Willy, hotel Magazine Company, located in Chicago, and circulated generally thru out the hotels of the United States. Some few prune recipes follow:

**Prune Whip**—Take one pint of prune pulp, which is made by first stewing the dried prunes and putting them through a colander; then add to the pulp the well beaten whites of two eggs, and beat; put one cup of sugar on the stove with enough water to dissolve. Add one-half package of gelatin, and when all has been dissolved, put through a strainer and add to the pulp. Beat until stiff enough to mold and serve with whipped cream.

**Steamed Prune Pudding**—Mix together, two-thirds of a cup of stale bread crumbs, two-thirds cup sifted flour, two-thirds cup finely chopped beef suet, two-thirds cup light brown sugar. Add two beaten eggs, one-half teaspoonful of salt, two-thirds cup of sweet milk and same of prune juice. Then add a teaspoonful of baking powder. Stir liquids into the dry ingredients and pour into buttered mold leaving plenty of room to swell. Cover mold tight and steam three hours. Serve with any good pudding sauce. This will serve eight people.

**Prune Conserve**—9 cups ground or chopped Italian prunes, 9 cups sugar, 3 oranges, 2 lemons ground whole, one large can pineapple, grated. Prepare the evening before and let stand overnight with sugar. Boil, but not long enough to taste strong; then add four cups chopped walnuts, cook about five minutes. Seal tightly.

**Prune Pudding**—2 eggs well beaten, 1 cup sugar, one-half cup flour, one half teaspoon baking powder, 1 cup chopped nuts, 1 cup chopped prunes; mix well and bake carefully as it burns readily. Let stand until next day and before serving break in small pieces and mix with whipped cream.

**Prune Trifle**—Line a dish with stewed prunes, beat the prune juice up with two sheets of gelatin. Put a layer of cake crumbs over the prunes pour the juice over all and leave to stiffen. When cool put sweetened whipped cream on top and a few blanched almonds.

**Prune Layer Cake**—Cream one third cup of butter and gradually beat in one cup of sugar, the grated rind of one lemon and two beaten eggs. Mix and sift one and three-fourths cups of flour with three teaspoonfuls of baking powder and one fourth teaspoon of salt. Add to the creamed mixture alternately with one and one-half cups of milk. Beat until very light, bake in two layers and put together with prune filling.

**Prune Filling**—Boil one cup of sugar and one half cup of water until the syrup will form a soft ball when tried in water. Add one eighth teaspoon of cream of tartar, pour slowly on the beaten white of one egg, then add two thirds cup of cooked prunes, stoned and cut up in small pieces, one teaspoon of vanilla, one third teaspoon of lemon and heat until stiff enough to spread.

## Jewish Assembly Meeting Today

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—The first Jewish constituent assembly of Palestine convened in Jerusalem today, according to advices received at the headquarters here of the Zionist organization of America.

Although the labor element in the assembly has a majority, no ultra-radical legislation is expected, the advices stated, the national radical party being moderate and the "capitalist" group favoring modern social innovations. Women delegates took their seats notwithstanding Orthodox protests, the advices added. The assembly has the sanction of Sir Herbert Samuel, British high commissioner to Palestine.

In the elections held last April not only did many women vote, but several were elected as delegates, including two from Petach Tikvah, the oldest Jewish agricultural settlement in Palestine.

The national radical party, according to the Zionist organization, favors development of co-operative societies as well as encouragement of private initiative. The "Etra," or "capitalist group," favors profit
