

Official Democratic Statement

Senator Harding's inaccuracy of statement is so persistent that to ascribe it to intentional misrepresentation which would be a severity which most Americans would gladly escape, but for a man in his position reckless misstatement is almost as discreditable.

Discussing the Shantung award in the treaty of peace, Mr. Harding said that China had been persuaded to enter the war, by the United States, on the side of the allies, and yet, "when the war settlements came about, China sought to be represented at the Peace conference, and they ought to have been represented, but for some reason they were not," and for this reason millions of Chinese "were delivered over to a rival nation with the consent and approval of those who spoke for America in Paris."

Without considering the merits of the Shantung dispute this statement contains so many untruths that its acceptance cannot fail to vitiate any judgment founded upon it. In fact, China was represented at the Versailles congress of Nations by a distinguished delegation of seven members, with many counselors and attendants, the leaders being Lou Tseng Tsiean, Kung Hsiang Ko, Dr. Wellington Koo and Dr. Chouling Thomas Wang. They were active to all the conferences, but when the council decided against them in the Shantung affair, and refused to accept any reservation on their part, they declined to sign the treaty, saying that China would become a member of the League of Nations, to which it would look for redress, when it signed the treaty of peace with Austria.

Just now the supreme republican purpose is to vilify and belittle the President of the United States, and if Senator Harding is to acquire that title, his habitual looseness of speech will become something more serious than a party liability.
