BUTTE, Mont., Oct. 11—Montana miners are trying metal helmets for workmen as a safety device. These are somewhat similar to the trench helmet used in France, but they only weigh seven ounces. Much of the injury in the mines is caused by falling tools and small rocks. The hats it is believed will resist or turn such objects.

Scores of the helmets have been distributed by the Safety Department of the Anaconda Copper Mining Company and if the experiment proves a success a supply sufficient for all miners will be obtained and sold at cost, it is announced.
