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Attempt Made to Destroy Newspaper

NORTH BEND, Or., Oct. 12.—Failure of the fuse attached to four quarts of dynamite confined in a gallon syrup glass jar to burn saved the plant of the Sunday Morning Bee from destruction and the life of its owner, Frank B. Cameron, whose home is in the building. The bomb was placed in the basement of the Bee office some time Sunday night. Editor Cameron found it next morning.

Two Years Search Reveals Lost Body

LAFAYETTE, Ind., Oct. 13.—After two years of persistent search of world war battlefields and cemeteries in France, the body of Sergeant William Cottingham, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Cottingham of this city, has been found in the Romagne cemetery by Mrs. J. F. Wright, of New York.

Sergeant Cottingham was reported missing in action at Attigny, October 15, 1918, to which place he had been sent with Company F, 2nd Engineers, to construct bridges over the Aisne river and Ardennes canal. Available government records contained no information other than that he was missing. Mrs. Wright, a friend of the family, decided to conduct a personal investigation and went to France.

It was after Mrs. Wright had visited most of the battlefields and war cemeteries that she obtained information about the missing man. She learned from the French government that the body of an American soldier had been left on the bank of the Aisne river and had been buried by the Germans. Later it was removed to the Romagne cemetery. Mrs. Wright went there and by means of the grave marker determined that the body was that of Sergeant Cottingham.

"BILL SIKES' HOUSE" MUST GO

Located in District Made Famous by Dickens, and Stands in Way of Improvements.

The house from whose roof Bill Sikes tried to lower himself by a rope to escape the mob that had tracked him to Jacob's Island is to be torn down. Bill, you remember, made a mistake as he tried to swing clear of the roof, and the noose at the end of the rope caught him and hanged him, whereat his dog, trying to leap from the roof to his shoulders, missed his aim and fell into the ditch at the base of the house, dashing out his brains on a stone.

Jacob's Island is in Redmondsey, near St. Saviour's docks. The ditch or canal which separated it from the mainland and which carried water from the Thames to the mills and tanneries in the district, long since disappeared. Bill Sikes' house was identified some time ago by the discovery of an old map of the district, on which its location was plainly indicated. It is in the rear of a house in Eckett street, and is used as a stable. The London county council plans to improve the entire district, so the region made notorious by "Oliver Twist" must go. The name of the sixteenth century Jacob, who had a large house and garden on the island, before it became an industrial district, is still preserved in the nearby Jacob street.—Detroit News.

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—Armed of the army and navy, including many who won fame during the war by their exploits, will gather here on the night of November 11 to celebrate the second anniversary of the signing of the armistice. The committee in charge has made reservations for 3,100 diners who will be arranged according to squadron, flying fields and other units to which they belonged.

Military rank will be forgotten at the dinner, according to announcement by the committee. General will be mere pilots, exchanging their stories of war experiences with other men who served in the lower ranks.

Arrangements for the reunion are in charge of a committee of which Laurence LaTourrette Briggs, founder and first president of the Flyers Club of America, is chairman. Other members include J. B. Taylor, Jr., and Albert O. Read of the navy; Charles J. Biddle, Charles Hanson, Towne, Harold E. Hartley and Cole J. Younger of the army.
