Official Republican Statement

WARREN G. HARDING



The success of the republican party in the election of a president and congress will mean the following important things. Let every point be carefully pondered:

- 1—Well organized and efficient government.
- 2—Stopping the enormous waste of money now going on.
- 3—Relief for the taxpayer.
- 4—A cabinet of able men, not a bunch of clerks.
- 5—Doing away with one-man government.
- 6—Sweeping out 200,000 useless employees now kept on the public payroll.
- 7—Correction of tariff laws so that foreign wheat, wool, sheep, cattle and lumber cannot come in duty free in competition with the American producer.
- 8—Generous systematic aid to the crippled soldier, even if necessary a cut forty million yards of red tape which the democratic administration has wound around its bureaus and agencies.
- 9—An association of nations to prevent war, while at the same time preserving the American constitution.

Canada is in a panic over the fall in the price of wheat, threatening ruin to the farmers, which means trouble for almost every body. During the world war, the great wheat crops of Australia and New Zealand could not be taken to Europe, for lack of shipping. Canada and the United States were the great sources of available supply. Now Australia and New Zealand are supplying Europe and wheat has tumbled. Associated growers and handlers in the United States are endeavoring to hold up the price by combination. At the same time the democratic tariff law is admitting wheat duty free, and the country is being flooded with Canadian wheat. The situation is tremendously serious. We are going with a low wheat price, the planting of wheat will be discouraged and a scarcity may result. To the grower who has not disposed of his crop the outlook is gloomy indeed, even as the republican president and congress shall be in office the American grower will be protected. Reasonable protection will benefit all of the farmers who are to be ruined, there is not much hope for the rest of us. A tremendous object lesson is presented today to the sheep grower, and the grain grower and there are others. A little sacrifice of thing for a few years will result in a United States Senator, for instance, will not go far with a practical man these days.

All the democratic effort to make the country believe that ex-President Taft will not support Mr. Harding's views of the league is exploded. Within the last few days Judge Taft has said: "It has been clearly demonstrated that the representatives of the people of this country will not stand for Article X. The stubbornness of the president in refusing to accept endorsement by the senate of the league covenant without Article X defeated the treaty. Now, Mr. Cox has swallowed Article X and he declares that as chief executive he will not approve the league without it. That means that with Mr. Cox we shall get no league." These are Judge Taft's words, and he is supporting Harding, Herbert Hoover, who also wants a league, is supporting Senator Harding. Not a first-class American statesman is with the president or Cox in this matter. Is everybody wrong but Wilson and his cuckoo Cox?

The sentiment is developing everywhere that republicans will generally vote a straight ticket this year. The country has had a severe lesson, but it has learned it.
