## Official Democratic Statement

JAMES M. COX



A straw ballot taken by the Portland Labor Press, indicates that Governor Cox will receive an almost solid labor vote in Oregon in November. In the first days of balloting the Ohio progressive received 230 votes from the laboring men of Portland, Debs 54, Harding 12, and Christensen 11. Votes were taken at car barns, at the Central Labor Council, at the Labor Press, at the Carpenters' Council, Building Trades headquarters, and Metal Trades headquarters.

The street car men voted 89 times for Cox and one voted for Harding; at the Central Labor Council Cox received 53 votes and Harding 3, at the Labor Press Cox got 11 votes to Harding's 3, and the Carpenters' Council voted 38 to 2 in favor of Cox. Cox beat Harding 24 to one at the Building Trades headquarters, and 15 to 2 at the Metal Trades headquarters.

The number of labor elements covered in the vote leads political students to believe the vote is representative of the sentiment in labor circles on the presidential situation. The fact that Cox received such an overwhelming majority in each place sweeps away doubt as to whether the working men of Oregon will lend divided support to any candidate.

It is believed, in view of the Cox vote and the practically negligible support for Harding that the Debs and Christensen votes will largely go to Cox on election day. Labor men will realize the futility of voting for either Debs or Christensen, observers say, and will throw their combined voting power behind Cox in preference to Harding. Moreover, if the vote in Oregon is close, a solid labor support might give Cox the electoral votes of this state.

The reason for the probable labor landslide to Cox is undoubtedly the past records of the two leading candidates as brought out in the report of the non-partisan investigating committee of the Federation of Labor.

Q. Can the council recommend war?

A. It can. But beyond the automatic commercial boycott, prescribed specifically by the covenant, neither the league nor any of its executive bodies can order any action binding upon its members. It can only propose, advise, or recommend. The members of the league do not agree to follow the recommendations of the council. They will consider them and the facts and reasons supporting them, and then make the final decision in accordance with their own judgment.

Q. How will the council arrive at its report?

A. By unanimous vote excluding any member which may be a party to a dispute.

Q. Can the league interfere in purely domestic affairs?

A. It cannot. The covenant specifically exempts disagreements involving purely domestic affairs.

Q. How will "purely domestic affairs" be determined or defined?

A. At present they are defined by international law.

Q. Can you give an example?

A. Immigration is defined by international law as a domestic question. If we should decide to exclude any class of immigrants and the governments of which they were nationals should object, the resulting dispute, even though it threatened war, would lie without the scope of the league of nations. The same principle applies to disputes over tariffs.

Q. Can the United States define more certainly than does international law what we consider domestic questions?

A. We can, by an interpretative reservation.

Q. What is an interpretative reservation?

A. A clear statement, made when we ratify the covenant, of how we understand the provisions to which we subscribe.

### A B C OF THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS

#### IV.—The League Cannot Interfere in Domestic Affairs.

Q. If the boycott failed, could the council then declare or order war on an offender?

A. No. It might recommend war on the offender. It could not declare or order war. In most civilized nations, just as in our United States, the power to declare war is vested in a parliament, congress or chamber of deputies elected by popular vote. And the rest of the nations, like the United States, are unwilling to grant even a shade of this power to any world league.

Q. What is the reason for the automatic blockade provided for in the covenant?

A. Within nations order is preserved and crime is prevented by subjecting the offender to penalties, such as fine, imprisonment or death. Law would be ineffective without these penalties. In the league of nations the sole penalty which its members are bound to inflict is the declaration of outlawry, involving the commercial boycott. This is the feature of the league of nations which distinguishes it from international courts of voluntary arbitration, such as the Hague tribunal.
