

MAKE MARKETS FOR FARMERS

In a prosperous farming community is little if any of prevailing social unrest to be found in the vitiated atmosphere of the congested urban centers.

The most prosperous state in the union from a farming standpoint is California, where the farmers are organized into state-wide co-operative marketing associations which sell the farmers product in the world markets at satisfactory prices.

These organizations were made possible through the leadership offered by the state itself through a commissioner of markets. The duties of the market director is clearly defined. His province is to keep the farmer advised of possible markets and to help and organize into co-operative marketing associations, that he may sell a standardized product.

The slogan of the market director of California has been:

"Keep the producer producing by giving him a fair price for his product and you are performing the highest service to both the producer and the consumer."

No amount of propaganda will explain to the satisfaction of the farmer the reason why the consumer oftentimes pays hundreds percent more for a food product than the farmer originally received.

Reports from California indicate that of all states in the union it is the least affected by the present unrest, and bankers, business men and leaders in every community attribute this to the fact that the farmers, receiving a fair price for their product, are perfectly satisfied. Agitators cannot offer them more than prosperity, and this they have in full measure.

The proposed market commission plan is designed to bring about in Oregon the same satisfactory market system that has been built up in California—Oregon Journal.

Robert Stanfield Visitor In City

Robert N. Stanfield, republican candidate for United States senator, arrived in Roseburg at an early hour this morning and will remain in the city for several days meeting the voters of the county and discussing with them the political situation.

"I have just come from Jackson and Josephine counties," said Mr. Stanfield, "and after visiting there in addition to other places in the state, I am confident that this is to be a straight republican year, for all indications are favorable to the republican party. I believe that Hard-



ing and Coolidge will win Oregon by a majority of from fifty to eighty thousand votes, and I believe that other republican candidates will be elected. I find in my visits in various sections of the state, general dissatisfaction with the administration. Farmers especially desire the return of a protective tariff. In eastern Oregon they have been injured by the importation of Canadian wheat, in western Oregon the wool men have been affected by the importation of Australian wool. The producers are calling for protection and the improvement of market conditions.

"I find considerable interest over the present senatorial outlook. There are in the U. S. senate 47 democratic senators, 47 republican senators, and La Follette. Oregon's next senator will undoubtedly swing the deciding vote on important issues, and aside from my selfish ambition, I believe that Oregon, a strongly republican state, should be represented by a republican."

Raising Bamboo in Louisiana

The department of agriculture tells the people of this country that experiments in Louisiana show that Chinese and Japanese bamboo may be grown there and that the cultivation of some varieties may be profitable.

Mention is made, for instance, of Phyllostachys pubescens, which one may eat as a salad when the shoots are six or eight inches above the ground, or which may be used for timber later, as the "shoots" reach a height of from 60 to 70 feet in three weeks.

The bamboo, we are told, may be used in building operations or for telephone poles or spars, hence it is recommended as a source of wealth to those who live in southern Louisiana. It may be profitable to them, but folks in the North feel that the Louisiana residents will find it more profitable to continue to raise sugar cane and the price of sugar, remarks the Hartford Courant.
