## NEWBERRYIZED

When Governor Cox accused the republican bosses of a purpose to "Newberryize the country," he coined a phrase not soon to be forgotten in a matter of political, financial and criminal record.

In 1918 the task set for the gold-diggers was the election of a congress opposed to the president of the United States. Michigan was a weak spot in the line, owing to the candidacy of Henry Ford. To gain control of the senate all republican areas had to be kept and several democrats displaced. A supreme effort in behalf of Truman H. Newberry was therefore necessary in Michigan, and as it turned out, his purchased election was what gave the republicans a majority on for-then to pack a committee on foreign relations against the League of Nations, and made it possible for Mr. Lodge to break the treaty of peace.

Persons whose memory is good will recall the fact that when Mr. Ford complained that the election had been bought, Mr. Newberry and his agents were as vociferous in their denials as Chamberlain Hays, and Treasurer Upham, A. W. A. They were charged with preposterous and unproved counter-exposures. They made light of indictments and charges at the law. Yet Senator Newberry and sixteen others were found guilty of criminal conspiracy and the judge who sentenced them said such conditions are to be endured the bases and separations of every man for political preferment must be measured by the size of his pocket.

At the trial it was shown that, to Newberryize Michigan, money was distributed lavishly, not only in regular channels, but through private organizations, churches and clubs. Fifty dollar bills were given in books, which were given away. "Loans" were made to those who asked for them. In one place a bribe was covered by the threat of an adverse court decision. Money was spent to develop a democratic opposition to Ford. The defense finally admitted an expenditure of \$178,000 but the judge placed the estimate on Newberry's campaign at from \$100,000 to \$1,000,000.

When Michigan was Newberryized the state was divided at party headquarters and funds apportioned according to the assumed needs of each locality. This arrangement with the quota system operated by the republican national committee for the collection of the millions to be spent on the election of Senator Harding. In 1918 the county and district committees in Michigan were asked by Newberry's managers to make their official lists of receipts and expenditures. The amount of the actual amount is about the proportion of 2 to 1 in favor of some cases where the buy's agents are willing to admit the year.

The United States Senate has been Newberryized. The League of Nations has been Newberryized. The League of Peace has been Newberryized. By reason of our continuance in a state of war, with most of the laws still in force, the industrial, economic and judicial systems of the country have been Newberryized. The presidency only remains, it that also to be Newberryized?



## A REPUBLICAN ON THE SENATORSHIP.

Concerning the election of a United States Senator, the Medford Mail Tribune, which is supporting Harding for president, declares that it would be folly to elect Stanfield, as Chamberlain has proven his usefulness to both state and nation and that in ten years, Stanfield could not secure the prestige, if he had the ability, that Chamberlain has today. Says the Mail Tribune:  
"There never was a time when partisan considerations had less reality than they have today. The reality is particularly noticeable in the Stanfield-Chamberlain contest. Chamberlain is acknowledged as one of the five or six really effective members of the upper house. As far as opposition to democratic inefficiency and Wilsonian autocracy is concerned, he has in the last four years taken the palm from the most bigoted of the republican opposition."  
"But it is not on this ground that he appeals to this paper. We are for Chamberlain simply because we believe it would be utter folly from the standpoint of Oregon's interests and from the standpoint of plain business interest of the community to lose Chamberlain's services at this time."  
"This involves no disparagement of the republican nominee. He may be as effective and astute as his ardent friends proclaim. But if he exceeds their estimates a hundred fold he could not, by any chance, be as much use to Oregon in ten years, as Chamberlain is today—or will be for the next four years."  
"No paper and no individual, not completely blinded by political-partisanship, could, in our judgment, look at this situation differently, and he has many,—has established a position of power and prestige in Washington, which is not only a

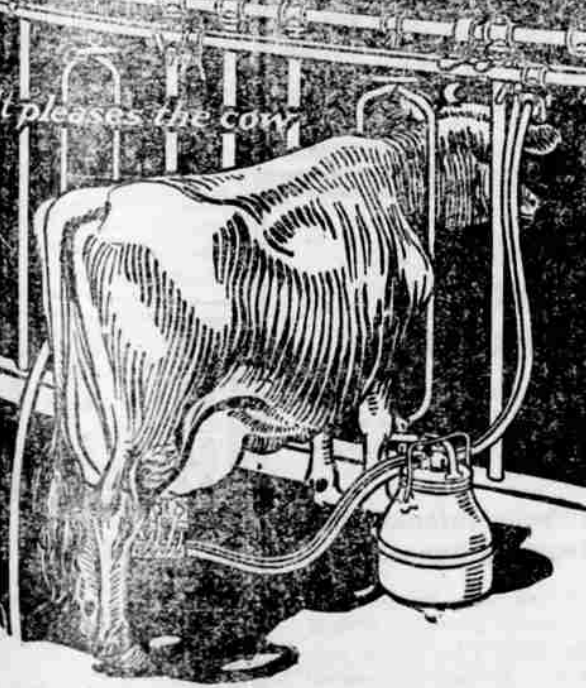

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great asset to himself, but a great asset to this state. Why sacrifice this asset, now, on the altar of partisanship which has no validity whatever.  
"Such a sacrifice to us looks like downright folly. Chamberlain has never been a hide-bound partisan. He has fought his own party when he believed it wrong, and he has fought for the opposition when he believed it right. Above all, he has worked for the best interests of Oregon, and whether demands come from a republican or democratic source, he has been the most effective force Oregon has had to secure results.  
"Keep him there—that is our contention. Not on the ground of political non-partisanship, nor the ground of anti-Wilsonism, nor any ground whatever, but the sane, hard headed ground of Oregon's self interest."  
This is the logical view to take of the election and one that appeals to all Oregonians. Because Oregonians have appreciated the loyal service of Senator Chamberlain to America, as well as to Oregon, he has been repeatedly elected and will be re-elected, over an opponent whose chief recommendation is the party label and his money.

## TAFT, HARDING AND THE LEAGUE

Former president Taft does not hold a very flattering opinion regarding the statesmanship of Warren G. Harding as expressed in his peace treaty.  
Concerning Harding's plan to establish a separate peace with Germany, Mr. Taft says:  
"Mr. Harding says he has no ex-

pectation of finding it necessary or desirable to negotiate a separate peace treaty with Germany. Then he must look to the Treaty of Versailles for those rights and privileges, and he can only secure them by becoming a party to it."  
Concerning Harding's vague plan for a new society of nations as a substitute for the League of Nations Mr. Taft says:  
"No one can suppose that the principal allied powers will consent to a new association or League when the old one is a part of the Treaty of Versailles, and it would be foolish for Mr. Harding to insist on this when only through a ratification of the Treaty can he make secure our rights and privileges against Germany."  
"Mr. Harding's plan to revive the dead and 100 percent failure, the Hague Tribunal, and "put teeth" into it, is referred to by Mr. Taft as follows:  
"Mr. Harding prefers the Hague Tribunal as the proper court, but the Root-Phillimore court, created by article XIV of the Covenant of the League of Nations is far better adapted to the purpose which Mr. Harding has in mind than the Hague Tribunal. The Hague Tribunal with its purely voluntary jurisdiction and voluntary selection of judges, contains no solution of the difficulty."  
There is no doubt but that the former president having a keen sense of humor and a philosophical mind gives one of his famous chuckles whenever he reads one of Harding's front porch homilies on the League of Nations.

As to what Mr. Taft thinks of Mr. Harding's contention that it is a question of covenant or constitution and that the League sets aside the constitution, is shown in the following:  
"I did not think and I do not think that anything in the League covenant as sent to the senate would violate the constitution of the United States or would involve us in wars which it would not be to the highest interest of the world to suppress by universal boycott and if need be, by military force."  
"I consider that the moral effect of Article X on predatory nations, would restrain them from war as the declaration of the Monroe doctrine has done, and that the requirement of the unanimous consent by the representatives of the great powers in the council before League action would safeguard the United States from any perversion of the high purpose of the League."  
Furthermore, Mr. Taft believes that the League is the most important issue before the people and that it justifies bolting the party. He says:  
"Moreover, I believe that the issue of the League transcends in its importance any domestic issues, and would justify and require one who believes so to ignore party ties and secure this great boon for the world and this country."
