Washing Rugs.

When either rugs or small carpets require washing dissolve four ounces of good white soap in four ounces of boiling water. When cool, add five ounces of glycerin and two ounces of chloroform. Bottle and cork well for use. When needed add one teaspoonful of the preparation to a pail of tepid water and wash the carpet with a flannel and soap in the usual way. One wash will have a wonderfully cleaning and brightening effect. Stretch out on a flat space, tightly nailing the corners or sides if necessary.

Braves of the Passamaquoddy Indians at the Pleasant Point (Me.) reservation do a thriving business among summer visitors by the sale of moccasins made from the feet of seals. Seals are prolific in Passamaquoddy bay. The Indians kill many of them each year. The hides are tanned and used for various purposes and the feet are worked up into footwear both for their own use and for commerce. The fact that there is always a claw, or nail, left for each of the five toes makes these articles of footwear unique and gives them an appeal to the tourists who visit the reservation.

While never working conditions can be attained by properly shading and installing the lamp, much can be accomplished by shading the eye. But like lamp shades, eye shades may be good and bad. To the latter class belongs the curved, opaque shade with its edge made conspicuous in the field of view by a dark lining. Such a shade, acting as a distracting object, not only disturbs the adjustment of the eye, but by darkening the upper half of the field of view causes glare on working surfaces on which there is no glare and increases the glare on surfaces on which glare is already present, medical men assert.
