STANFIELD INTERVIEWED

An interview with Robert N. Stanfield, Candidate for U. S. Senator on the Republican Ticket, Reprinted.

Your reporter called upon Mr. Stanfield at his room and was impressed with the manner of the man and his serious yet genial and modest way of talking about the issues and his candidacy.

He makes you feel that he feels the responsibility of the place he seeks and has the one overpowering desire to be of service to the people of Oregon. There is no bombast or blarney about him. He is thoughtful and progressive, but practical with all. He is no dreamer or visionary, but a man of force and action, without conceit and seeking co-operation and counsel that by it all Oregon may benefit.

Your reporter put many vital questions to him, and not once did he falter, dodge or sidestep.

When asked, "What is your position on the League of Nations?" he replied: "I am unalterably opposed to our alliance with the present league of nations, which can only function when supported by American man power and resources, by nations and sinews of war that this country alone can provide.

I am opposed to any league that will compel us to send our boys overseas to fight and die on one side or the other of some old European feud.

American participation in any European disagreements should be voluntary and not at the dictation of some super-Government.

I am however heartily in favor of an association of all free and independent nations for the prevention of war and the maintenance of peace.

What do you think should be done to relieve the Oregon tax payers from the handicap of having vast

areas of untaxable lands held by the Federal government?

Without hesitation he said: "About sixty per cent of the area of Oregon is unsettled, undeveloped and untaxable. Some 13,000,000 acres of this is in the Forest Reserve, being held for the benefit of future generations of all the States of the Union. The task of changing the long established policy of not taxing federal property, even though it be held for the future and not open to settlement, is too great to expect relief within our generation, but something can be done to get benefits in lieu of taxes, and I believe Congress should appropriate sums of money that will equal the amounts these lands would pay in taxes if privately owned, for some legitimate purpose that will aid the development of these states in the west that have the large reserves.

"The building of Public Highways is one of the big demands that have come upon our people during the last decade, and I am heartily in favor of federal appropriations for public highways. I am also in favor of the apportionment of these funds to the states that may be known as 'Federal Reserve States' to the annual amounts equalling taxes, and the balance according to population, and road mileage.

What About Our Harbors?

It was then that you saw the gleam of fire show in his eyes, as he said: "The waste has been grossly discriminated against by the Federal Government in the development of her harbors. No other state in the Union has been required to provide match money to develop her harbors, but Oregon has put up 50 percent of the cost in most cases and a gross amount of about \$8,000,000 for harbor improvements, while all the other states have had their harbors developed entirely at Government expense. It is a gross injustice. I believe Oregon should be treated the same as other states and her several harbors improved as

they have been in the east and south by the government without compelling our people to match the government.

Think of it. 50 per cent of our area owned by the Federal government. The improvement of our harbors will directly enhance the value of these vast lands, and yet we are asked to pay half the cost. It is time Oregon fought for a square deal.

How Do You Stand on the Development of Our Vast Water Power?

He replied: "Our water power should be developed and made to serve the people now here and those that will come as we grow, instead of permitting it to flow out to sea unharvested and unreserved. I am in favor of legislation that will permit and promote this development in such a manner as will serve the people at the minimum cost, but with such safe guards as will prevent these power sites falling into the uncontrolled possession of private monopoly.

How About Reclamation?

Again the fire shot from his eyes for he comes from that part of the state where reclamation has been carried on to some extent, and he is familiar with the conditions in Idaho, and he said: "Do you know that Oregon has paid into the Federal reclamation fund \$12,000,000.00, and received from this fund \$5,000,000.00, while Idaho has paid in to the fund \$5,000,000 and received \$23,000,000, and this twenty-three millions dollars has developed and made taxable property in Idaho to the amount of \$140,000,000 that now pays taxes and will continue to do so to the end of time.

"Reclamation? Every mother son of us should fight in congress and out for at least all we pay into this fund, to be expended in reclaiming the arid lands of Oregon that they may be made valuable and productive and placed on the tax rolls to help bear the public burdens.

How Do you Stand on the Soldiers' Bonus Bill?

I took a position on this very early and am thoroughly committed. I am unqualifiedly in favor of the Soldiers and Sailors Bonus Bill as passed by the House of Representatives and believe it should be passed by the Senate as soon as it convenes.

How About Income Tax Laws?

I heartily approve of levying income taxes, for those with large incomes can easily afford to contribute a portion of their large incomes to support the government that save them their chance, but I would increase the exemption to \$2,000 per annum for unmarried and \$3,000 for all married people. And I would certainly simplify the forms of making report of these incomes so any man could correctly make out his own report without employing a technical expert.

I believe our federal laws should be simple, plain and easily understood and observed.

And I also favor the immediate repeal of war time laws and the dismissal of the army or war time employees. Send them home, where they can engage in some useful and productive employment and take their names off the payrolls.

Have you anything to say on the Tariff, Mr. Stanfield?

We now have a tariff commission, but it does not, and will not function under a democratic administration, for the democratic party has long been committed to free trade policy.

The continuance and preservation of our American industries, from farm to factory, requires protection from competition of foreign products which are produced by cheap, underpaid, poorly fed and housed labor.

Let me give you a few instances. The American market for lumber products, (one of the large sources of income for our state) is in the north middle west states, contiguous to the Canadian border, and this territory is flooded with lumber and shingles from Canadian mills where Coolie labor is employed.

Our markets are demoralized by New Zealand butter, Australian wool and mutton, beef and hides from South America, wheat from Canada, and woolen rags, (commonly called shoddy) from Germany, of which 17,000 tons have recently come into this country.

The present standard of living for our work people can only be maintained by a scientific administration of a protective tariff policy, that will equalize industrial conditions and protect legitimate industry but not foster monopoly.

At the present time we are beginning to feel the effects of the importation of raw materials and farm products, but in another year, under the present free trade laws we will seriously feel the effects in manufactures and history will repeat itself again. Industry will gradually close down as it did in 1894, 5 and 6 and Coxey's armies and free soup houses will again be familiar sights in our fair land.

The democratic free trade laws are now in force and can only be changed by having a republican president, republican house and republican senate. With any one of the three democratic these laws cannot be changed.

How Do You Find Things Over The State?

Oregon will cast the largest republican vote in its history. The party is united and in harmonious approval of the republican doctrines. The people are determined as never before to return this government to the safe and sane control of the republican party, and do not

feel like taking any chances on losing the U. S. Senate by the election of a democratic senator from Oregon.

In the past many republican votes have been cast for democratic senators because of personal friendship but this year the people are keenly feeling the need of having a senate that will support the republican president, who seems now very sure to be elected, and they are not inclined to take any chances for friendship's sake.

Mr. Stanfield while having every evidence of perfect confidence in his own election, and admitting privately that he was sure of a big majority over his opponent as a man could be, true to his personal modesty, refused to say as much for publication, saying, "It sounds too much like bombast to make positive claims of anything as uncertain as an election."
