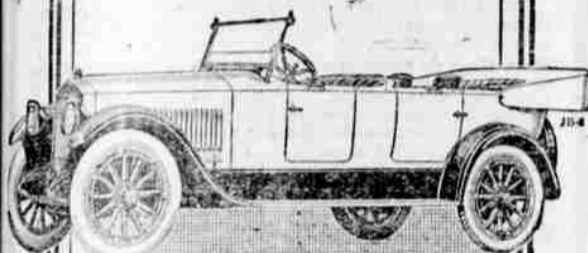

THOU SHALT NOT STEAL.

(By William Howard Taft.)

The second step forward involved in this League of Nations, is Article X, by which means members of the League will undertake to respect and preserve the territorial integrity and the political independence of its members. This, in effect, is an organization of the united power of the nations of the league to maintain and preserve an international commandment. "Thou shalt not steal." It is the union of the nations to suppress the spirit of conquest which led Germany to drag this world into the awful war through which it has just passed. It is the effective answer of the Nations to the German declaration that "Might makes Right." It is the protection of smaller nations against the spoliation of them by larger and more powerful nations. It is the heart of the League, and is the effort of the world for law abiding nations to defeat forever the greedy purposes of militarism, whether of Germany or any other nation.

It is said that this will involve the United States in wars to protect the nations in distant parts of the world in whose welfare we have no interest and will call for the expenditure of money and the lives of our boys in which we ought not to involve our country. This is not true. The effect of the organization of the league with the threat against any nation who should violate Article X, and attempt a war of conquest against another nation, will be to restrain that nation and prevent it beginning war. The knowledge that there would be visited on it the overwhelming power of the United Nations, first by a universal isolation, and, second, by united military forces, will render such a war almost impossible. We employ a police force not because the members of that force are constantly engaged in clubbing men who violate the law, but because their presence restrains the men who wish to violate the law. The very organization of the League, with the force behind it, is the restraining influence that will prevent war. Only in infrequent cases will war result. Take a well known instance. The

Monroe doctrine is nearly a century old. It notified the world that we would resist by force any European nation violating Article X against any American nation. American statesmen there were who said it would involve us in a constant war, just for a century we have maintained the doctrine without firing a shot or losing a man. No European nation, when greed for colonies was rife, dared to engage in any war with us in an attempt to conquer an American state and gain a colony in this hemisphere. (From page 9 of a 16 page pamphlet entitled, "Ratify the Covenant," by William Howard Taft, issued June 27, 1919, and published by the League to Enforce Peace, of which Mr. Taft is president.)

"Yesterday in his speech of acceptance, Senator Harding unequivocally took his stand upon the paramount issue in this campaign—the League of Nations. The republican party stands committed by that platform. Its standard bearer has now accented that platform. There can be no misunderstanding his words."—Senator Hiram Johnson in a newspaper interview on July 22, 1924.

"War is more improbable than ever. And why? Because the mothers of America can now say when it shall be and when it shall not be." Governor Cox in a speech at South Bend, Indiana, August 19, 1924.

Oregon Must Have a Port Equal to Any Port on the Pacific Coast.

Initiative measure No. 210 on the ballot gives to the Port of Portland means to create such a port.

The primary object of this bill is to furnish the means to insure the opening and maintaining of a 30-foot channel from Portland to the sea and of building and establishing port facilities at the City of Portland sufficient to handle the foreign and coastwise shipping of that port.

The cost of this improvement will be met by the people living within the boundaries of the Port of Portland.

When you go to the Polls November 8 second vote 210 YES and give to the Port of Portland the power to maintain its 30-foot channel to the sea and to build adequate port facilities to handle all of the great products of the interior of the state.

The passage of this bill means lower freight rates for the products of Oregon in reaching the markets of the world and a consequent greater profit to the producers.

This is the most important and the most valuable measure that has ever been put up to the voters of the interior portions of the state.

At a special meeting of the Douglas County Taxpayers' league the following resolution was passed regarding the four and five per cent limitation measure:

Whereas, a law has been proposed limiting the interest rates which may be charged on money loaned in the State of Oregon to four and five per cent, and,

Whereas, this measure would have a tendency to drive capital out of the state and prevent needed development, and,

Whereas, this measure is decaying the voter who sees it for the first time and has not studied the effect which its passage would have, therefore be it

Resolved, that the Douglas County Taxpayers' League go on record as being opposed to this measure; that we urge all members of the league to inform themselves regarding the effect of the passage of this measure upon farming and other Oregon industries, and that we aid in defeating the measure with our votes at the coming November election.
