WARREN G. HARDING

As the campaign draws to a close it is again made plain that personal abuse of a candidate for office does not win with the American people. While Governor Cox levered himself in the estimation of the people by reason of his "mud slinging" campaign, Senator Harding, by reason of his fair and dignified course, stands immensely higher in the estimation of the people than when the campaign began.

Elihu Root, who was secretary of State, under president Roosevelt, stands in the first rank of international lawyers, and in fact has recently been engaged in drafting important provisions of the constitution of the Hague Tribunal. He is sincerely in favor of an association or league to promote world peace. Like ex-president Taft, he is supporting Senator Harding for the presidency, because he believes that with Governor Cox in the presidential chair, the deadlock which has long existed would simply be continued. This is for the reason that Governor Cox has pledged himself to the Wilson League, and, by his criticism of the United States senate has forestalled all possibility of any constructive action along this line. Mr. Root recently delivered an important speech upon the subject, from which we quote as follows:

At the outset of his address, Mr. Root said:

"I think a large majority of the American people earnestly wish for an organization among civilized nations through which the nations shall co-operate to prevent future wars, and that the United States shall do her full share in that organization. I certainly desire this very strongly."

Mr. Wilson in being unwilling to accept reservations to the peace treaty and league of nations, has left us practically where we stand today," Mr. Root said.

"Mr. Cox declares," he continued, "that he will insist upon a treaty just as Mr. Wilson negotiated it, and upon that understanding Mr. Wilson is supporting Mr. Cox for the presidency. The democratic platform says substantially the same thing."

"On the other hand, Mr. Harding, who voted for ratification of the treaty, and the senate reservations, declares that he would do it again under the same circumstances."

**Issue Defined.**

Mr. Root said it is plain that the issue is not between a league of nations and no league of nations. "The question is whether the agreement creating a league shall be accepted absolutely unchanged, or shall be modified to meet the American objections. I would be glad to have the provisions of the agreement changed so as to obviate these objections. Then would follow an ordinary common sense negotiation as to the best way to obviate the objections. Regarding this process I have to say:

2-CENT LETTER FAVORED.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23.—Postal estimates to be submitted to the coming session of congress, Postmaster-General Bureason said, will not recommend any increase in the 2-cent first-class letter rate, in connection with any plan of taxation revision, and will renew the department's previous recommendation for a 1-cent local delivery rate.

The postmaster-general estimates that a reduction of the local delivery rate from 2 cents to 1 cent would probably increase postal revenue rather than decrease it.

sections can be met and obviated without interfering with the scheme of the league or impairing its usefulness.

**Other Nations Willing.**

"Second, without pretending to any special knowledge, I think there are clear indications that the other nations concerned are willing to make such changes as are necessary to meet the American objections."

"Third, I think the objections ought to be met and obviated. The covenant contains some provisions which are unnecessary, unwise and injurious and they ought to be changed."

"Fourth, there is nothing unusual or disturbing about negotiating the necessary changes. If the other parties are willing—as they seem to be—it will be a simple matter."

Mr. Cox is claiming he has been misrepresented. So, of course, he immediately asserted that Mr. Root had misrepresented him, evidently forgetting that shortly after his nomination he went to see President Wilson and announced that he was in full accord with the president on the League of Nations. This "accord" with the president, Mr. Cox would now like to have forgotten. Mr. Root answered the charge of misrepresentation in a complete and crushing way and showed up Mr. Cox as a shifty politician and a loose reasoner. It is remarkable that every first class statesman in the United States is against the Wilson league, against Cox, and for Harding in this campaign. Voter think it over.

If you believe world peace is the paramount issue, and that peace must be brought about by a league or association of nations, then the only thing to do is to follow Taft, Root, Hoover and other statesmen and support Senator Harding. Wilson couldn't get anywhere with his league. How can Cox expect to do any better? Harding is against the Wilson league, but is for a league which shall be in accordance with the constitution of the United States and gives no power to a council sitting in Europe to enshroud us in war.

The republican county ticket is going strong with the voters. A few more heads may be made and making very fast and trying to break down established reputations by falsehood but they might as well "split against the wind." The tide of public sentiment is sweeping the republican ticket on to a great victory. Lincoln said that "You may fool all of the people some of the time or some of the people all of the time; but you can't fool all of the people all of the time." Cock-and-bull" stories don't go down in these enlightened days.
