Q. What are the specific obligations relating to war which we assume in subscribing to the covenant?

A. They are three in number:
(1) Not to go to war until three months after a report by the council of an award by arbitrators.

(2) Not to go to war at all with a nation that has complied with the recommendations contained in a report unanimously agreed to by the council.

(3) To apply the economic boycott against a nation which has refused to war in violation of the foregoing obligations.

Q. Suppose, now, the council has made a unanimous report making recommendations for the settlement of a dispute to which we are a party, and that we are unwilling to comply with the recommendations. Does our refusal to comply require the league to take any action against us?

A. It does not.
Q. If the other party to the dispute also refuses to comply with the recommendations, what happens?

A. War is permitted without interference by the league.

Q. If either party complies with the recommendations, what is the effect?

A. The other party cannot go to war without incurring the penalty of having the economic boycott put into force against it by the league.

Q. Are we not in the same position as we should be in if we felt compelled to refuse to accept the report of the international commission under which the twenty arbitration treaties to which we have subscribed?

A. Almost. The only difference is this: In case of our rejecting the recommendations of a report under existing treaties we have only our own reputation to deal with; but in case we reject the unanimous recommendations of the council and our opponent complies with them, we cannot go to war without having the whole league arrayed against us in commercial boycott.

Q. What is the basis for the common assertion that the league is a super-state?

A. The belief that the council and assembly have power to bind the member states to act in accordance with their decision.

Q. Is this true?

A. It is not. As we have seen, the council and assembly have power only to advise, propose, or recommend. There is no obligation to comply with the advice, proposal, or recommendation, and no penalty attaches to refusal to comply.

Hotel Put Prunes
On Bill of Fare

The efforts of Ray Clarke of the Umpqua Hotel dining room to gain recognition for Oregon prunes is meeting with popular favor all over the state and the local hotel was given an excellent write up in the Oregon Hotel News, in which a number of recipes are given for the various ways of cooking prunes. The stewed prunes will go off the bill of fare if the proposal of Mr. Clarke is accepted, and Oregon prunes will be listed instead. This suggestion has met with favor among a number of hotelmen, who, in the future, will not advertise stewed prunes on their menu, but will use the word "Oregon Prunes."

Saturday the chef at the Umpqua served prune whip with the result that the number of dishes prepared were sold out within a very few minutes over fifty servings being taken within a very short time. Prune cake and ice cream are also great favorites. The recipes submitted by Mr. Clarke are being tried out and the new methods of serving the fruit are proving very popular.
