Many inquiries are being received as to whether or not the stores are to close on Armistice Day and whether or not the schools will be dismissed upon that holiday. Governor Olcott proclaimed Armistice Day a legal holiday in the state of Oregon, and consequently all banks, business houses and offices will be closed. Schools will also be dismissed by order of the State school superintendent, who yesterday notified county superintendents to close the schools in Douglas county on that day. In order that the day may be even more thoroughly set aside in Roseburg, Umpqua Post of the American Legion last night requested Mayor Hamilton to issue a proclamation requesting that all people observe the day and that business houses close and that all stores and homes display the American flag prominently on that day.
