Mexican City Honors Legion

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Nov. 2.—The members of the American Legion posts in this city have just returned from the fiesta given by the city of Tia Juana, in honor of the Legion. For two days and nights, the citizens of the Mexican city held open house and entertained the American guests with bull fighting, barbecues, fireworks and a review of the Mexican troops. The affair was promoted for the sake of international friendship, by Mayor Gallardo, of Tia Juana, and was entered into with hearty approval by all residents.

Special trains bore the Los Angeles and San Diego Legionnaires across the border. They found the quaint border town profusely decorated with American flags and the Legion banners in their honor. A band preceded the tourists to the best hotel, where rooms were reserved and paid for by the Mexicans. The Legion men were enthusiastic over the friendliness of their welcome. They are planning a return reception for the Tia Juana, to continue the work of international amity begun by Mayor Gallardo.

Copper Fields Are Forging Ahead

QUINCY, Cal., Nov. 2.—Starting with a small discovery less than ten years ago, and without any of the spectacular strikes or stampedes which mark the history of most mining regions, the Plumas copper field is forging to the front as one of the greatest in the west, if not America. For a number of years the field was thought to be small and probably limited to the original deposit discovery. With two miles 14 miles apart producing millions of pounds of copper annually, and scores of strikes in widely scattered sections, made in prospect shafts or by diamond drilling, this theory has now been abandoned and the belt is now declared to extend from within three miles of Reno, Nevada, across Plumas county and well into Shasta county, California, a distance of more than 100 miles, with lateral limits of at least ten miles.

RIVERS TURNED INTO SEWERS

Streams That Once Were Famous London Thoroughfares Now Are Far Under the Ground.

The river Tyburn, which, along with the Thames, helped to make Westminster, in London, an island in Saxons times, can still be traced from the Marble arch neighborhood to Westminster. It originally flowed through Hyde park and St. James' park at a time when these were marshlands. Several feet below the pavement in Great College street are the remains of a bridge which spanned the Tyburn at this spot just before it entered the Thames.

But the most famous of all the buried rivers of London is undoubtedly the Fleet. It flowed through Jack Ketch's warren, where 1696 at times such notorious characters as Dick Turpin and Jack Sheppard. It was a favorite haunt of the highwaymen and other thieves who infested the district of Saffron hill and Hatton garden to drop through a trapdoor to the Swayn's hall of the Fleet, pull a plank after them and so escape capture by the Bow street runners. The Fleet ditch ran into the Thames at Blackfriars, and small craft used to put into it with merchandise.

In the middle of the city was the Wellbrook, and on the east side the Lamborne, and in the western suburbs the pleasant stream of the Oldbourne, also deep enough to accommodate good-sized craft. Other London rivers not yet wholly sewered are the Roding, the Lea, the Ravenshoe and the Wandie, but the Bristol is no longer visible anywhere.

The Roman Coliseum. The Roman coliseum was the largest and most splendid of the buildings known in architecture as amphitheatres, which the Romans invented for exhibiting gladiatorial combats, fights of wild beasts and other spectacles. The reputation of arch beyond arch and story over story gives this amphitheater its imposing grandeur. This principle of duplication of parts, of which the Gothic architects afterwards made so much use, is carried to a greater extent than in any other Roman building. It did not have a roof. The upper story is not arched like the three lower stories, but solid and with pilasters. Some architects think it was meant wholly for the purpose of supporting and working the great velarium or silk awning that covered the arena during the representation, which may have been attempted when the amphitheater was first erected.
