COUNTY BELIEVED
GONE REPUBLICAN
Only Two Offices Considered
At All Doubtful at Two
O'Clock Today.

CLERK IS VERY CLOSE

for Commissioner is Neck
and Neck—Stearns Has Slight Lead
Over Long—Big Vote Polled In
All Parts of the County.

Throughout the county great interest was taken in yesterday's election, and while the vote was not 100 per cent of the registered voters, yet it was as good as in former presidential years, and in some precincts perhaps better than over before. The county nominees all had a strong following, but the fight hinged on the offices of state senator and county clerk and commissioner. The county nominees, Eddy, Riddle and Stearns, had made a good campaign, and all night long as returns came in it was a neck and neck race between the republican and democratic nominees for the three offices, with a slight lead for the republicans, Eddy, Riddle and Stearns. Early morning returns began to change matters a trifle, with Stearns dropping behind Long, of course, the democratic nominee for county commissioner.

The contest for sheriff between Eddy, republican, and Pearce, democrat, was indicated to be close, returns coming in to the News-Review during the latter part of the night, but by 8 o'clock this morning the complexion of the situation changed materially. Stearns forging lead by at least 500 votes, which was maintained all the forenoon, later augmented by returns from the precincts, which assured him a big majority.

The clerkship was one of the most contentious in this county many years, and as this office has been held by the democratic nominee several years, it was anticipated that Riddle had a hard time to unseat Lenox. Early returns indicated pre-election forecasts in this matter, and during the late night and early morning friends of the republican candidate, as president. The governor himself said he would make no statement tonight. His newspapers, however, carried the election returns under the caption, "Republican Landslide: Harding Wins."

Governor Cox himself did not formally concede his defeat regardless of the statements made in his paper. He said:

"I will make no statement tonight, and whatever my paper says is purely impersonal."

COX WATCHES RETURNS

DAYTON, O., Nov. 2—Other than casting his vote early in the day, Governor Cox, democratic presidential candidate apparently took only a passive interest in the election, but tonight he went to his newspaper office to watch returns. The governor was smiling when he reached the office at 7:30 p. m., accompanied by Mrs. Cox, but made no comment on the election. At that time the newsboys were on the streets with an extra edition carrying news unfavorable to the candidate. Outside of his office a big crowd had gathered to await the record of the vote, and it greeted the governor with a cheer. Simultaneously a bulletin from his office showed that the governor had carried 12 out of the 265 precincts in Montgomery county including Dayton by 300 votes. During the day, most of which was spent at his home near here, the governor seemingly showed no worry and paid no attention to the early scattering returns. His first information came when he reached his office, and then he offered no comment.

STANFIELD THANKS FRIENDS

District Attorney George Neuner this afternoon received a long distance telephone message from Robert Stanfield, who is practically conceded the election to U. S. senator from Oregon. Stanfield informed Mr. Neuner that his lead had reached 15,000 votes and was expected to go to 25,000. He asked the attorney to thank his many friends who supported him in Douglas county.

44 Precincts Complete

At 12:30 p. m. today 44 precincts in the county were complete. These precincts gave the following vote on national state and county candidates: Harding, 3,237—Cox, 1,784—Chamberlain, 1,897—Stanfield, 2,420. Van Winkle, 120—Coshaw, 545—Eddy, 2,513—McClintock, 2,075—Marsh, 2,811—Bailey, 1,517—Shirra, 2,668—Hees, 1,232—Long, 2,332—Stearns, 2,423—Pearce, 2,121—Starnier, 2,898—Lenox, 2,542—Riddle, 2,497—Calkins, 3,450—Chapman, 1,301—Fear, 2,990—Wright, 1,547. The big race at one o'clock centered around the county clerkship, and Riddle and Lenox were running neck and neck. The 44 complete precincts give Lenox a slight lead. A telephone message was received from Dayton stating that Riddle received a majority of over 90 votes in that precinct. Reedsport has not made any official report except to state that the count is in progress and will probably not be completed until midnight tonight. The number of votes cast there totaled 516, and the few that had been counted indicated that the race between the county officers was a close one.

49 Precincts Complete

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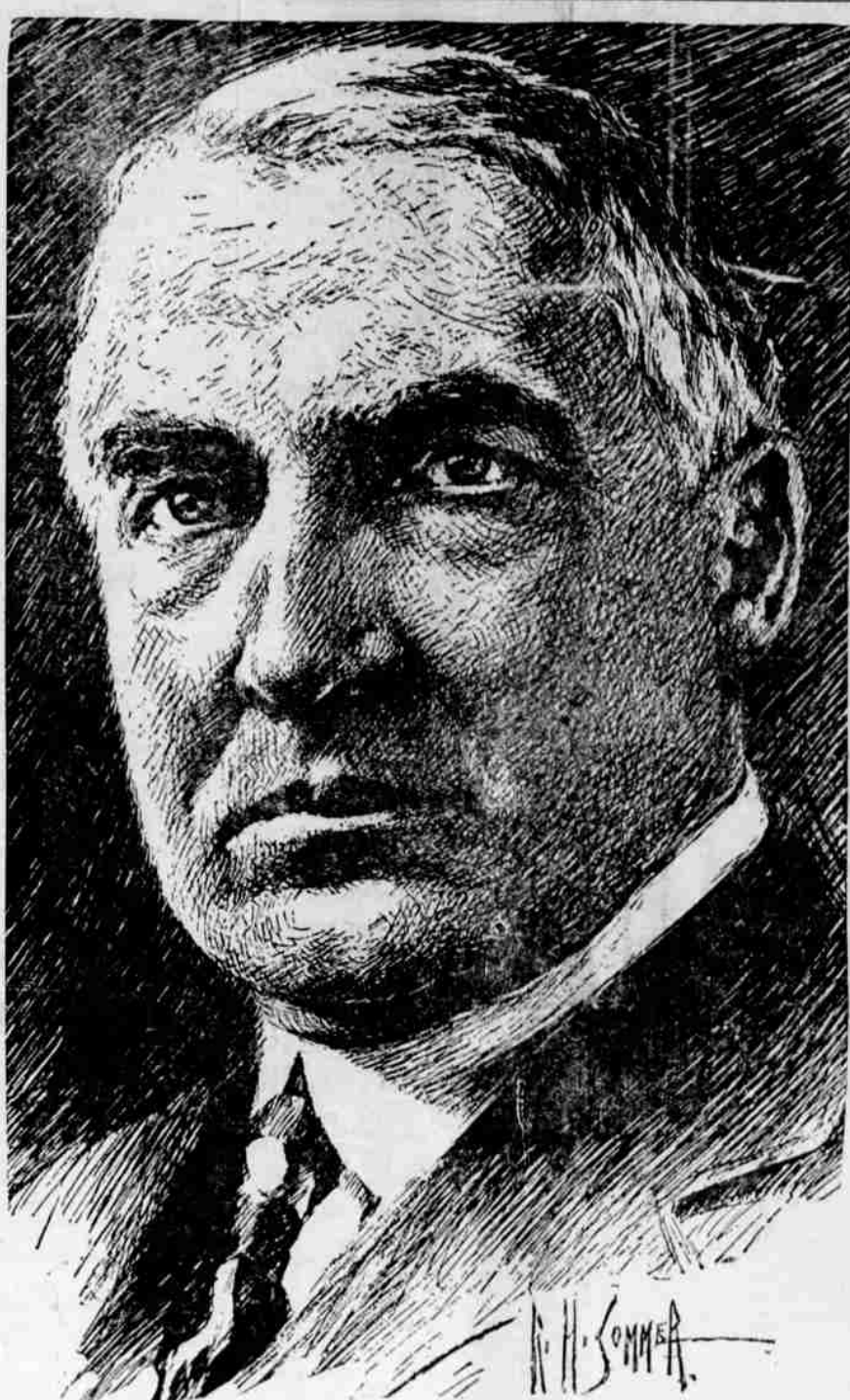
THE PORTLAND MARKET

No doubt Governor Olcott will be much surprised when he hears of his visit to Roseburg today. A visit, which, by the way, he never made. The power of resemblance and suggestion was aptly demonstrated this morning. It was first reported by Guy Gordon that Governor Olcott was in the city greeting his friends and within an hour no less than 15 persons had "seen" the governor, while a few were purported to have had conversation with him. Big Sum Changes Hands on Election

PORTLAND, Nov. 3.—Betting took a sport yesterday and all told, there will be several hundred thousand dollars change hands on the election results. Between \$150,000 and \$200,000 were wagered on the senatorial contest, for this was considered a better betting proposition than the presidential race. Even money was the rule on Chamberlain and Stanfield yesterday with bets ranging from \$5 to \$5000. A bet of \$1000 to \$500 was laid that Chamberlain would win by 5000 votes over his republican opponent. A month ago the Chamberlain backers were offering 4 to 1 with no takers. The odds gradually changed as the "straight ticket" argument was pushed and Stanfield's stock rose, until beginning last Saturday the wagers were at even money. On this basis much Stanfield money appeared but late yesterday afternoon there was still several thousand dollars of Chamberlain money without takers in one of the downtown poolrooms. One eager store is holding \$60,000 in stakes on the senatorial fight.

Harding Odds Are 4 to 1

Odds of 4 to 1 prevailed that Harding would be elected. The odds in the east were greater, but 4 against 1 was the accepted ratio in betting circles in Portland yesterday. No large bets were made, but there were many democrats willing to risk anywhere from \$10 to \$100 because of the attractive odds. During the late hours yesterday afternoon a new phase of betting developed. A number of bets were made at even money that Cox would carry Multnomah county. These were offered by members of organized labor.

Brisk Betting Developed Over the Congressional Election

The betting was that McArthur would not win by more than 5000. Some wagers were placed at even money. Odds of 2 to 1 were offered that McArthur would win, irrespective of majority.

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Music Club Have Crowded Meeting

The opening number of the Lyceum, the Little Symphony concert, is to be given tonight, and only today remains in which to raise a considerable amount or those who are standing back of the entertainment will lose. Several teams were appointed at the meeting of the Music club last night, and they will spend today making a complete canvass of the city. Each member of the club has been asked to take a ticket and it is expected that much headway will be made today.

Kietzer, a prominent member of the club from Yoncalla, sang two groups of songs, followed by two songs by Miss Ruth Wilcox. A general community sing, led by Miss Moore, ended the program. A dainty lunch was served and a social hour completed the evening.

REPUBLICANS SWEEP THE ENTIRE NATION

Will Have Majority Vote in House and Senate—Stanfield Leads Oregon.

FAVORS HARDING 2 TO 1

State Remains in Republican Column and Race Between Chamberlain and Stanfield is Exciting—Result Not Known.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—One of the most sweeping republican victories in the party's history stood record for Warren G. Harding, for president and a republican congress.

Tremendous jumpstarted republican pluralities continued mounting today. The pluralities early today gave Harding the assurance of 329 electoral votes against 127 for Cox, and with 75 votes doubtful, which makes a larger majority in the electoral college since 1888 except for the vote for Woodrow Wilson in 1912 during the republican split.

Republicans Control Congress

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—Republican control of congress assured by two more votes with an increased house majority and a big prospect of an increase in the senate was the major part of the election sweep. A net gain of 20 votes in the House is shown with complete returns in only 17 states, most of them democratic strongholds. Eight of fifteen republican senatorial candidates are winners and seven others have substantial leads.

In ten other states all republican candidates are in the van. For nineteen democratic seats nine were won, all of the successful candidates being from southern states, while in border and western states the others are fighting an uphill battle.

PORTLAND, Nov. 3.—Senator Warren G. Harding carried the state of Oregon by about two to one.

Returns from 609 precincts give Harding 27,254; Cox, 15,540. Watkins received 126 votes, Debs 523 and Cox 73.

Stanfield is Leading

Robert Stanfield is leading Senator Chamberlain in the U. S. Senatorial race. Returns from 611 precincts give Stanfield 21,865, Chamberlain, 18,605, Slaughter, 749, and Hayes 615, Stevens 102.

Kozer Has Big Lead

Sam Kozer has a big lead in the race for secretary of state. He received 1198 votes in 131 precincts. Sears received 947 and Upton 90.

For Public Service Commission

One hundred and eight precincts give Bennett 3,032, Butcher 6,181 and Newman 892.

Supreme Court Vacancy

George M. Brown received 2,385 votes in 88 precincts, and W. O. McCarthy of Portland, 217.

Attorney General

L. H. Van Winkle, republican, received 1,195 votes in 83 precincts, Bailey 696 and Coshaw 106.
