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NATURALISTS TO
SEEK MISSING LINK

Expedition Will Set Forth From
China Next February to
Search For Fossils.

EXPECT TO FIND BONES

Chinese Now Use Fossils for "Medicine." Not Knowing of the
Great Science Value Which
They Might Be.

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—The expedition sponsored by the American Museum of Natural History which will set forth for China next February, will search not only for fossils of the ape-man, regarded by biologists as the "missing link" in the chain of evolution, but will study the aboriginal tribes now said to be fast disappearing in China.

"We know as little about some of the living natives as about the fossil history of the country," says Roy Chapman Andrews, who will lead the expedition. "Long before the Chinese arrived, China was inhabited by aboriginal tribes, which were pushed south and west just as the Indians were driven westward by white men who advanced across the American continent."

"Remnants of nearly 30 of these tribes, such as the Lolo, Moson, Liso, and others, are rapidly disappearing, and the expedition expects to study them before they become extinct."

Describing these aboriginals with whom he has hunted, Mr. Andrews said they are totally unlike Chinese, having tall and slender bodies, long faces, patrician noses and other characteristics of Caucasian blood.

Mr. Andrews says that scientific men are now agreed in the belief that the oldest prehistoric remains of man, and of many beasts, lie somewhere within the great Central Asiatic Plateau where few white

men have ever penetrated. One of the reasons why little is known of China's fossils and those of interior Asia is that material of this sort is carefully concealed by the Chinese, who term the relics "dragon's bones" and use them for medicinal purposes, said Mr. Andrews.

One result expected is the education of Americans in a knowledge of the immense continent across the Pacific. Whether success or failure meets the attempt to find the "missing link," hundreds of thousands of specimens of Asiatic animal and plant life are to be collected and brought to America. These it is planned to place in the proposed \$12,000,000 Hall of Asiatic Life in this city.

Hunts for wild animals, many of which the explorer hopes to bring alive to the United States with fur and skin. In a corner of the Gobi desert are herds of wild horses while on the Tibetan steppes are enormous Yaks, snow leopards and giant pandas. In China is the Takin, a strange ox-like creature with a golden fleece, which roams the highest mountain valleys and represents the intermediate stage between the antelope and the goat, says Mr. Andrews.

Headquarters for the expedition will be at Peking. The work of the expedition is to continue five years. The first year will be devoted to the studies in paleontology and zoology in China. The second year the work is to be carried on in Mongolia, with zoologists to add to the field staff. Then for the next three years the entire staff will be spread in widely scattered areas in Asia.

Franklin Penny
Found by Settler

DOVER, Mass., Nov. 3.—A Franklin penny, the first copper coin to be authorized by congress has been found on the homestead of one of the settlers here. It was struck in 1787 and is one of the few that were coined. The penny took its name from Benjamin Franklin, because of the inclusion in its design of the homely admonition, "Mind your Business."

On one side 13 circles appear linked together, a small circle in the middle with the word "United States" around it, and in the center, "We are one." On the other side is a dial with the hours indicated, a meridian sun above it, on one side of which is the word "Fugio" and on the other the date of 1787. Below the dial appears the Franklin phrase, "Mind Your Business."

Estate to go to
Soldier Pension

VIENNA, Oct. 15.—The vast estates of the late Emperor Francis Joseph will be devoted to the pension fund of invalid soldiers under a decision just taken by the cabinet council. Certain castles and dwellings in this city and the nearby suburb of Baden will either be occupied by them or the fund will receive the rentals and other accretments.

Included in the arrangement are the splendid estates of Orth, Vossendorf, Maltgöfelen, Poeggstall, Augarten, Laxenburg, Hetzendorf and many others, the decision also covering the Lainz Tiergarten, near Vienna, on which a group of some hundreds of former soldiers recently squatted.

The income of the Prater, Vienna's most famous suburban park, with its numerous restaurants and amusement places, is also included. Many of the estates contain model farms and others are under rental of much value.

The late Emperor Francis Joseph, who died in 1916, bequeathed 60,000,000 crowns from his private fortune to a fund for wounded soldiers, invalids and relatives of men killed in the war. To two daughters and one granddaughter he bequeathed 20,000,000 crowns each, the remaining 19,000,000 crowns of his estate to be divided among several other legatees.

It has since been reported that an American-Dutch company has bought the Emperor's summer palace at Ischl, in the Tyrol, for hotel purposes. The hunting estates and lodges of the late Emperor in the Tyrol were advertised for sale in January last. Francis considered these the finest in Europe.

Question of Pay
For Damages Raised

DUBLIN.—Taxpayers in Ireland are agitated over the question who is to pay for the damages resulting from reprisals committed by the "Black and Tan," or semi-military force, employed by the government to suppress Sinn Fein disorders.

The total amount of damages resulting from Sinn Fein disorders, and reprisals by Orangemen and the government agents is estimated to be nearly £10,000,000. Already the awards amounting to £5,000,000 for damages inflicted by the Sinn Feiners have been assessed against the taxpayers.

The law prescribes that the taxpayer shall pay for all wilful damages to property or life maliciously inflicted. The county judges who pass upon claims arising from damages in Black and Tan reprisals, have granted awards to the claimants and attempted to make them the charge against the local authorities. They have, however, indicated in their judgment that they believe the government should make good the losses caused by its own servants.

The principal taxpayers in Ireland are for the most part Ulsterists, who are the largest property holders and would be hardest hit if the taxpayers were compelled to pay these damage claims. While they are anxious to put the government back, many of them disapprove of the Black and Tan reprisals and are unwilling to pay for the consequences of them.

The Irish Times, the principal nationalist newspaper, demands that the government shall make a clear public statement "that the obligation to compensate for murder, arson and robbery committed by the servants of the government is acknowledged by the government and will be promptly met."

The government paid the bill of about £2,000,000 for the damages suffered by the City of Dublin in the Easter week rebellion and this is pointed to as a precedent for similar action in the matter of the Black and Tan reprisals.

It is expected that the government will also be asked to pay the damages inflicted by the Sinn Feiners to which awards amounting to over £5,000,000 already have been made by the county judges. Besides there is a bill for the damage done by the Orangemen in the Ulster towns.

HARDING'S HOME PRECINCT
GIVES HIM 373 VOTES

MARION, O., Nov. 3.—Senator Harding's home precinct gave him 373 votes, four years ago, the governor's home precinct had gone democratic.

While the senator was at dinner late in the evening, a committee of employees of the Marion Star, his newspaper, called to present him with a gold printer's make up rule, and he came out on the front porch and with a choking voice thanked them for their devotion.

"I don't know of any call," he said, haltingly, as tears rolled down his cheeks, "that has aroused my emotions more than this. I have worked with you, and I have tried to be honest with you; and God knows I am called to responsibility. I am going to be honest with everybody in the world. I don't know if I can meet these responsibilities fully, but I know that I can meet them with the same honesty that I have treated you."

"I am just a plain, ordinary fellow, but I can be on the square and that's all there is to it."

Rear Admiral Grayson, the president's personal physician, spent nearly half an hour with Mr. Wilson after the latter retired, discussing the result of the election. Dr. Grayson said the president showed no indication of nervous strain and that he seemed cheerful. He added that the president had no comment to make on the result of the contest.
