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Sale of Railroad Linked With History

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 10.—The sale of the Denver and Rio Grande railroad to the highest bidder by an order of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals, marks the close of a tumultuous chapter of the history of the road founded by General William J. Palmer in 1871.

Millions of dollars a year in wages were paid annually in the prosperous period of the road's history, and other millions were used in numerous financial interests to gain the control of the road. From the time the Jay Gould interests caused the retirement of General Palmer from the road in 1883, it was the object of financial campaigns of rival interests until the receivership caused by default of the road in payment of Western Pacific Railroad bonds in 1913, bond payments having been guaranteed by the Denver and Rio Grande.

The bond issue was for \$50,000,000 and when the Equitable Trust company of New York brought suit and recovered judgment in 1918, this had been reduced to a little more than \$26,000,000—the amount of the judgment. On January 26 of that year, Edward L. Brown, president of the road and Alexander J. Baldwin, vice president of the Western Pacific, were named as receivers by Judge Walter L. Sauerb, of the United States Circuit Court of Appeals. A month later, Brown was named sole receiver of the road, to comply with the regulations of the United States Railroad Administration.

Hearings were held before a United States master in chancery and on September 25, 1920, an order was signed by Judge Sauerb, over a protest of the stockholder's committee, who asked postponement for a month. The road was advertised for sale, for 30 days, and November 20 set as the date of sale.

Pillage By Turks Being Investigated

CONSTANTINOPOLE, Nov. 10.—Pillage by the Turks of the Imperial Russian watering place of Abbas Touman in the Caucasus mountains, is being investigated here. A large quantity of the paintings and furnishings are in the temple of Enver Sultan of this little city, where many of the aristocracy used to pass their vacations. Has been discovered in Constantinople. Some of these furnishings are in the temple of Enver Pasha, formerly Turkish War Minister, on the Bosphorus, now occupied by the French general staff.

The pillage of Abbas Touman is one of the untold stories of the rapacious Turkish pashas and generals. Abbas Touman is unknown outside of Russia. Yet it was one of the little paradises with which the many countries lying near the Black Sea are blessed. Nestling in the mountains of Georgia, it possessed one of the beautiful and lengthy driveways for which the Caucasus is noted. During the hot summer months the Imperial Russian family used to pass a few weeks among the pines of this rich center of muscums, villas and churches.

Up the beautiful roads from Batum to Tiflis came in the spring of 1917, the Turkish army, following in the retreat of the Russian army which had gone Bolshevik. The Turk army was amazed at the riches of Abbas Touman. The commandant of the 81st brigade sealed up all of the riches that he could find. Then came the signing of the treaty by which Abbas Touman was left to Georgia.

No sooner had the Turkish commander learned of this treaty than he had gathered up, before leaving, all of the valuables and hurried them to Batum. He notified Essad Pasha at Constantinople that his booty should be offered to the Sultan. Meanwhile, as his army withdrew, it is charged that he systematically robbed the churches along the way and sent these treasures also to Batum. Two other Turkish commanders are alleged to have shared in the loot.

Finally the three men sent their private shares to Constantinople, when Enver Pasha demanded to have a look at the three lots. As Minister of War, he took his choice and sent some of the furniture and pictures to Kouratschesska, his marble faced palace on the Bosphorus, where they still remain.
