Armistice Sunday To be Observed

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—President Wilson today issued an executive order directing the flag to be flown at half-mast at all military posts, naval stations and on vessels and buildings of the United States, Sunday, Nov. 14, as a token of honor to those Americans who lost their lives in the great war. It is further suggested that private citizens participate by displaying flags at half-mast from their places of business and homes from sunrise to sunset Sunday.

The president's order reads as follows: "I hereby direct that on Sunday, November 14, 1920, the flag of the United States be displayed at half-mast at all military posts, naval stations, on vessels and on buildings of the United States as a token of the nation's participation in the memorial services held for the heroic American soldiers, sailors, marines and others who gave their lives to their country in the world war."
