#### FARM REMINDERS

Plant Pathology, O. A. C.—Anthracnose and fungus rots are developing on fruit to a large extent in Western Oregon this year. This is especially so in orchards which have not been kept clean by sprajing. The unusual wet weather of the fall has been a favorable agency for their development. But clean orchard swill have a untilinus loss from these diseases. If anthracinose is bad the orchards should be sprayed before winter, although it is now too late to prevent the first srop of the anthracnose from developing.
Farm Management, O. A. C.—How much does it cost to produce an acre of affalfa. Buta collected from 62 farmers in Malheur county show the cost to be \$8, and whole cost, including interest on the investment and the work to be \$18. The cost of srowing was \$3 more than the lay was sold for. This shows that while the farmer was not losing money, he was not making a fair interest on the investment.
