Gendale Boy Is Arrested For Theft

Floyd Belt, aged 20 years, is under arrest at Gendale charged with having broken into a merchandise store at that place and robbing the proprietor of a revolver, watch, jewelry, clothing and other articles. George Holtelaw, an incorrigible, who has been in trouble on numerous occasions, is being sought in connection with this crime but has disappeared from his home and cannot be located. Belt is of an age to come under the jurisdiction of the criminal courts and will probably be dealt with by the officers of that court. Holtelaw was arrested a year or more ago charged with various minor crimes and was kept in jail for several months, and figured quite prominently in a jail break and in the theft of several quarts of whiskey which were taken from the jail. It is claimed that several boys of juvenile age were implicated with Belt, but will be handled by the juvenile officers.

Turkey Men On The Ground Today

Turkey buyers from San Francisco and Seattle, as well as from other localities, are in town today getting in touch with the local situation and getting ready for the business which will open up in real earnest about the middle of the week. In addition, local firms who have always bought turkeys are in the field, and some lively competition is anticipated when the game is opened up. A gentleman representing a Seattle concern stated that turkeys are selling today in the Washington city at 42 cents for prime birds. He said that since the last steamer for Alaska had gone north there had been a slump of several cents in the price, as a great many tons of dressed turkeys were taken by the ship for the trade in the mining cities. While none of the buyers are willing to name an opening price, each apparently waiting for the other fellow to do it, the impression is gaining ground that probably the market will center somewhere around 40 cents. It was said today that owing to the fact of a general decline in all commodities, probably turkeys would be included in the lowered market condition. These factors are causing a hesitancy on the part of growers, so that at present the turkey trade for the Thanksgiving market is considerably like a sparring match for position. Farmers, on the other hand, allege that the excessive cost of feed warrants a better price than in 1919.

Mrs. F. W. Enke, of Portland, formerly a resident of this city, died at her home at 227 Argyle street, yesterday, according to word received in this city last night. Mrs. Enke was 64 years of age and resided in West Roseburg for several years living in Irving in Roseburg. She was a relative of John Nachter of this city. She is survived by her husband and a son, Fred. Funeral announcements have not yet been made.

Crop In County Is Doing Great

Broccoli throughout Douglas county is looking exceptionally well for this time of the year, according to those who made the tour on Saturday to the various farms where the vegetable is being grown. Over 22 persons all interested in the growing of broccoli made the inspection trip, and many new ideas as to the methods of growing, handling, etc., were obtained. There are approximately 150 acres in broccoli in the county, and this is the largest area of the product grown anywhere in the country, according to the latest figures. Prof. Boquet, who was present on the tour, is greatly enthused over the prospects for the future of this crop and says that Douglas county should give more attention to the growing of broccoli. Following the tour, the growers held a short meeting to talk over marketing conditions.
