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Growers Association To Hold Meetings

Three meetings will be held in the county by the Oregon Growers Association for the purpose of discussing matters pertaining to the welfare of the organization and to assist the growers in their problems. The first meeting will be held at Myrtle Creek on November 30, the second at Roseburg on December 1st and the third at Sutherlin on December 2nd. At these meetings, the officers will report the progress made, the market conditions and the results of the cooperative handling of certain products.

C. I. Lewis and M. O. Evans will be the speakers. An opportunity will then be given to discuss the future plans and to take over the problems facing the growers and to arrange for the work of the coming year. The surrounding towns and the rural communities will be invited to these meetings which are placed in these central locations in order that as many as possible of the growers may be reached.

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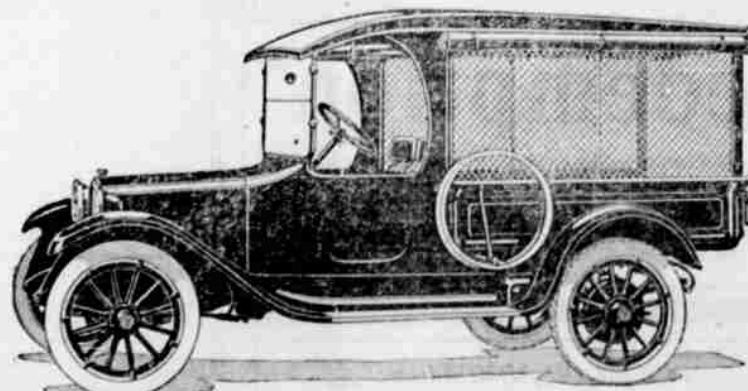
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
