Amendment Made To Old Land Act

The Act of December 11, 1919, amends the act of March 26, 1909, relative to filing applications for repayment of purchase moneys and the commissions paid in connection with land entries which have been rejected and payments in excess of the amount required, according to W. H. Canon, registrar of the local land office.

The new act limits the time of filing of applications for repayment or payment of excess amounts to 2 years after the rejection of the entry or the payment of the excess amount or two years from the date of the act, as to entries rejected or excess payments made heretofore.

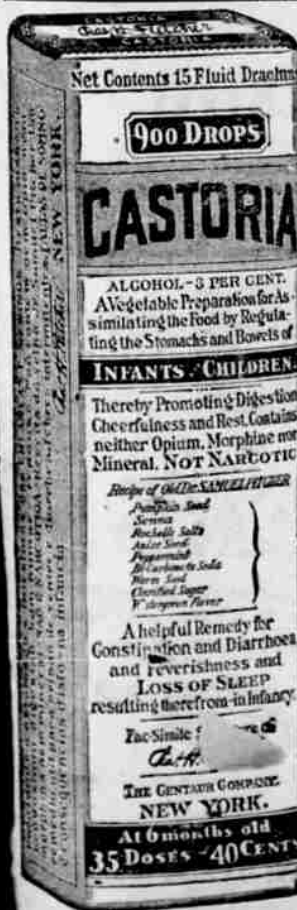
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
