

Pupils Sell Tickets For Art Exhibit

Much enthusiasm has been aroused among both the teachers and the pupils over the coming exhibition of pictures to take place at the high school, from December 1 to December 4th, the proceeds from which will go toward purchasing pictures for the grade schools. The exhibit was received from Tillamook, Oregon, last week and is now being arranged for display by a committee of the teachers. There will be some 200 examples of the modern Italian, Flemish, German, French, Spanish and American painting, as well as the art of the Renaissance.

At 7:30 each evening a different program will be presented by the school children and other local talent. The exhibit may be seen during the hours of 4 to 5 and 7:30 to 9, and on Saturday, December 4, the exhibit may be viewed all day.

The sale of tickets for the exhibition will be in the hands of the grade school children. Keen rivalry exists between the three buildings

These two pictures are to be placed on exhibition in one of the down town stores as soon as they are received. The price of an adult ticket will be 25 cents, while the grade school children will be admitted for 10 cents. These tickets will entitle the original purchaser to see and attend all four programs and to view the exhibit as many times as

he wishes. Tickets are non-transferable.

In order that the young people may get the most good possible of the exhibit, some time each day is being given in each room of the local schools, to an art appreciation study of many of the pictures that will be in the display. The benefits of the community to be derived from this exhibit cannot be computed.

Teachers and pupils are taking a hold of this movement in a most worthy manner. If the people of the city buy tickets freely, sufficient funds ought to be raised to enable a number of good pictures to be purchased for the schools. The goal of the school children is to sell a ticket to each individual of Roseburg.
