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Southern Oregon Land Has Sulphur

CORVALLIS, Nov. 27.—Alfalfa contains more sulfur than was supposed, and the sulfur supply on some Umatilla basin, central and southern Oregon soils is enough for 10 to 18 average crops only. These two facts go to show why sulfur sometimes doubles the alfalfa crop, when applied to the land at the rate of 100 pounds per acre.

Sulfur has doubled the yield on trial plots in Goose Lake valley. It has added one to two tons per acre in experimental trials in the Deschutes valley, dating back to 1912. Definite increases in yield have been gained by addition of sulfur to soils in the Grande Ronde, Wallawa, Baker, Umatilla and Malheur valleys.

Sulfur applications will increase alfalfa yield by at least one ton per acre on not less than 100,000 acres in Oregon. It also adds to the feeding value of each ton produced, where sulfur shortage exists in the soil.

Benefits from sulfur applied to field peas in Klamath basin and corn and beans in southern Oregon have been shown by experiments. Increase in the vegetable crops and protection from pests are reported from use of sulfur in the Columbia basin.

No benefits were obtained from use of sulfur on the coarse soils at the Hermiston station. Filbert Propagation Hastened. Time and cost of getting filbert stock for new plantings can be saved by layering the shoots that arise from the base of the tree during the first summer. Well rooted plants have been obtained the first growing season in O. A. C. station trials, and are ready for setting in the orchard next year. This is a saving of an entire year over present tactics, from the beginning of propagation till the stock is ready for the orchard.

Field Stadium Is Dedicated Today

SEATTLE, Nov. 27.—The University of Washington field stadium was dedicated here today by the booming of cannon from naval ships, and the army guns, by seaplanes and airplanes dropping footballs and by exercises participated in by Governor Louis F. Hart, and other officials, was constructed in six months by the

employment of revolutionary stadium construction methods. The dedication preceded the football game between Dartmouth and Washington.

The stadium can seat 30,000 spectators, and when the super structure is completed the amphitheatre will have accommodations for 60,000 people.

The stadium, U-shaped, of concrete and steel, on the shores of Lake Washington, was built without the employment of a horse or a steam shovel. The engineers built the tiers on which cement was placed for the seats by forcing sand in solution

through pipes up the inclines. Wooden frames had been erected and as the water flowed along it deposited a large percentage of sand in these boxes. Dirt and humus, being lighter than sand, did not drop into the forms but flowed along and back into Lake Washington. The result was that with the continual pumping of the saturated water, sufficient sand was dropped into the forms to make a more solid backing than if men had tamped the deposits.

A total of 127,000 yards of dirt were sluiced up the incline, and the concrete seats on the dirt fill were constructed within 24 hours after the water had drained away. 32 sections were poured with cement at the rate of a section a day. All of the materials were delivered to the stadium by water.

Fir seats, supported on iron brackets, with backs were erected on the concrete forms. The stadium has an open end toward Lake Washington, which provides for track games and for approaches of naval pageants.

Outside measurements of the new stadium are 600 by 700 feet. Inside measurements give a playing field 487 by 268 feet.

The distance from the top of one row of seats to the seats on the opposite side is 565 feet one way and 424 feet across. To make the playing field "waterproof" drain tile was placed under the field and 7500 tons of gravel and 4,200 tons of top soil were packed down.

To keep spectators from swarming over the field after contests, an old fashioned moat, six feet wide and six feet deep separates the seats from the playing field.
