Egg Pool Brings Nice Big Profit

PORTLAND, NOV. 29.—As the result of closing out a large stock of storage eggs at 49 cents a dozen, the Oregon Poultry Producers association has been able to turn over to its members who participated in the pool, a bonus of 17 cents a dozen.

It was on July 1 when the market price dropped from 44 to 40 cents that the management of the association decided to put the eggs in cold storage, and about 1600 cases were stored between July 1 and 26 and an advance payment of 32 cents a dozen was made.

The bonus recently turned over to members amounted to as high as \$200 for individual members.

According to the figures recently compiled by the management of the association during the two months of September and October handled a total of 563,293 dozen eggs at a value of \$315,144.

Irreducible School Fund Has Credit

SALEM, Nov. 29.—There is now a total of \$7,023,420.43 to the credit of the state's irreducible school fund at this time, a gain of \$417,614.92 over the figures of two years ago, according to the bi-ennial report of George M. Brown, secretary of the state land board, transmitted to the governor last Wednesday. Of this amount, \$6,295,472.68 is invested in lands, \$16,930 is represented by certificates of foreclosure on farms, \$252,528.44 is in school district bonds, \$47,875.33 is in cash and \$100,000 is due the fund from the Pacific Livestock company under an agreement entered into more than a year ago.

The agricultural fund has a credit of \$203,883.98, a total of \$103,635.36 is credited to the University fund and \$459,774.62 is credited to the rural credits loan fund.

During the biennium there has been a total of 62,523.25 acres of school lands, 40 acres of agricultural lands, 113.70 acres of tide lands, and .53 acres of tide lands land by the state land board, according to the report.

A total of 1371 loans were approved and \$2,511,160 from the common school, agricultural college, and university funds were placed out on loans during the two years.
