

Engineer Hurt In Fall Off Trestle

Bert Oman, of 1107 Third street, Eugene, a Southern Pacific engineer, was very seriously injured at about 8:30 yesterday evening when he fell from the Deer creek trestle, sustaining a bad rupture sprained wrist and other injuries, which may result in paralysis of the lower part of his body. It was Mr. Oman's first trip and he was not familiar with the territory. The extra freight on which he was riding stopped on the Deer creek trestle with the helper engine on the approach. Mr. Oman did not know that his engine was still on the trestle, and seeing Doss Burgess swing to the ground for an inspection of his engine, did likewise. He fell about 25 feet and badly ruptured himself, in addition to spraining his wrist and sustaining internal injuries which may possibly result in paralysis from the hips down. He was rushed to Mercy hospital and Dr. C. B. Wade called, and first aid treatment given. The case was turned over to the company doctor, L. M. Lehrbach, who operated on Oman this morning. The patient is doing as well as could be expected. Mrs. Oman arrived from Eugene this morning.

Boy Escapes State Reform School

SALEM, Nov. 30.—Walter Cochran, 17, escaped from the Oregon state reform school Saturday, according to the report made to police by Superintendent Gilbert.

The lad is said to be five feet, seven inches in height, and is dark complexioned. He was dressed in khaki clothes. It was stated. Police have not yet located him.

Addition to State Building Proposed

SALEM, Nov. 30.—The imperative need for additional quarters for state departments now occupying the capitol building and the supreme court building will be called to the attention of the forthcoming legislature in a supplemental report attached to the budget for the maintenance of the capitol and supreme court building and grounds, prepared by Secretary of State Kozler.

In this supplemental report Kozler calls attention to the fact that the walls of the new supreme court building are strong enough to support two additional stories and suggests this addition as a solution of the congested condition of state departments under existing conditions.

At the present time, Kozler points out, the state highway department and the industrial accident commission are occupying offices used as committee rooms during legislative sessions, necessitating a move at the convening of every legislature and causing much confusion as well as expense to the departments effected. The demands for space will not become less, Kozler declares, pointing out that the demand can be expected to increase from year to year.

If the suggested addition to the supreme court building does not meet the approval of the legislators, Kozler insists that steps must be taken toward the construction of a modern office building adequate in capacity and arrangement of construction to fulfill modern office demands.

Salem Man Is Sued by Bank

The Douglas National bank of Roseburg has filed suit against J. F. Hutchason, of Salem, formerly of this city, demanding judgment for the sum of \$74.50 which, it is asserted, is the balance due on a \$100 note which they allege was signed by Mr. Hutchason, September 30, 1916. The bank credits the defendant with payments on principal and interest amounting to \$28.50. Interest at 8 per cent from November 15, 1917, with \$25 attorney's fees is also requested. The suit was filed in the Marion county circuit court.

Oregon Asked To Use More Coal

An appeal to Oregon industries to substitute coal for fuel oil in order that California's oil output may be conserved for the use of the industries of the southern state is contained in a letter received by the public service commission from the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce. Oregon and Washington, the letter points out, use fully twenty-five per cent of California's output of fuel oil. Unless this demand can be checked through the use of other fuels by the industries of these two states, the industries of California must suffer in consequence, the letter declares, the southern state not being in a position to obtain cheap coal as are the states of the Pacific northwest.
