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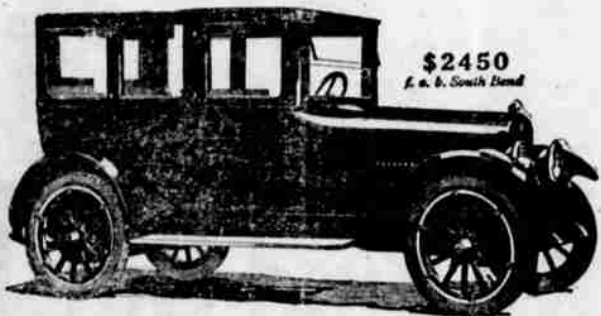

The elixir of a child's love and its power to straighten the viewpoint of men and women whose outlook on life has become distorted will be demonstrated at the Antlers theatre starting Thursday when Mary Pickford appears in "Pollyanna," her first United Artists production.

This picture play differs from any of Little Mary's recent productions in that she portrays a little girl all through the picture.

There is nothing more convincing than Miss Pickford's characterization in this photoplay. She does not merely act the part of a little girl, she is a little girl. Her work in the play "Pollyanna" indicates that she has spent some time in the study of children for there is not a single characteristic which is missed here.

The two men are charged by the government with conspiracy to defraud the United States out of income and excess profits taxes, alleged to amount to several million dollars.
