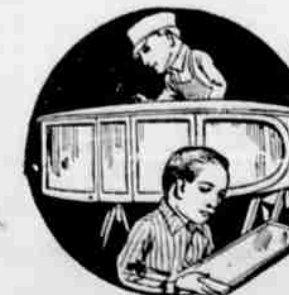

WASHINGTON, Dec. 3.—Co-operation of producers, bankers and the public generally is necessary to aid the farmers in the present situation of falling prices, Governor Harding, of the federal reserve board, told the senate and house agricultural committees today.

(By Associated Press). SALEM, Dec. 3.—The public service commission today interpreted the inter-state commerce commission ruling granting Portland a preferential rate, as applying to grain as well as other commodities.

### EQUIPMENT IS INSTALLED

The Sisters of Mercy have just received a battery of sterilizers such as are used in the very best of hospitals for the sterilization of the dressings, instruments, water, etc., for the operating room. The sterilizers are operated electrically and are the latest word in modern equipment. They represent an expense of about \$2,000.
