DIRECTORS FOR CHAMBER ELECTED
Interesting Meeting Held at City Call by Chamber of Com. Last Night.
PLANS ARE DISCUSSED
Committee Appointed to Arrange for Open Meeting and Banquet at Which Drive for Membership and Funds Will Be Made.

The Roseburg Chamber of Commerce is making rapid strides forward as evidenced by the good attendance and the great interest manifested at the meeting last night. The meeting was called to order at 8 o'clock and the financial statement placed before the members present. It was shown that all bills have been met, and that there is still a small balance in the treasury. The publicity booklet was approved and highly praised and was placed in distribution today. A publicity fund has been created to take care of the expense of the publication.

The local Chamber of Commerce is seriously handicapped by the lack of funds. While other cities and towns have publicity funds amounting to over \$10,000 in practically every instance, Roseburg is forced to limit her activities to an expense of not more than \$1,000. While other cities can send representatives to various meetings and can secure legislation on matters of importance, Roseburg has not sufficient funds for this work and consequently the results are much less than they should be.

GETS HEAVY FINE
Martha S. Weidemann, proprietor of the Roseburg Apartment House, was today fined \$175 and costs, after being adjudged guilty of the crime of unlawful possession of liquor. The testimony in the case was taken before City Recorder Whipple, who took the case under advisement until 10 o'clock this morning. Today he decided against the defendant and imposed the fine. Mrs. Weidemann's attorney, Albert Abraham, filed notice of appeal. Mrs. Weidemann's bond has not yet been fixed.

Miss McSwiney testified that Protestants and Catholics are equally represented in the movement for independence.
