**Railroad Plans are Abandoned**

PORTLAND, Dec. 9.—Plans for the construction of a railroad between Grants Pass and Crescent City, Cal., projected five years ago by the Grants Pass-Pacific Railway company, have been definitely abandoned with relinquishment by the company of a right of way grant made by the government, according to advices received by United States Attorney Humphreys this morning.

Five years ago Twoby Bros. of Portland backed the railway company and R. B. Miller, then traffic manager of the O. W., became head of the projected development. A right of way grant thru the Siskiyou mountains was obtained by the company. Suit was recently brought by the government to recover the land grant, but this was cancelled this morning by Federal Judge Bean upon receipt of the information that the company had recently filed a relinquishment of its rights with the general land office at Washington.

The company could not reach a co-operative agreement with the Southern Pacific Railway company, which it is said, feared opening of a diverting rail line at an ocean port at this point.
